

- 6. Don't be afraid to admit that you are less than perfect. It is this fragile thread that binds us each together.
- 7. Don't be afraid to encounter risks. It is by taking chances that we learn how to be brave.
- Don't shut love out of your life by saying it's impossible to find. The quickest way to receive love is to GIVE; the fastest way
 to lose love is to hold it too tightly; and the best way to keep love is to give it wings.
- 9. Don't run through life so fast that you forget not only where you've been, but also where you are going.
- 10. Don't forget that a person's greatest emotional need is to feel appreciated.
- 11. Don't be afraid to learn. Knowledge is weightless, a treasure you can always carry easily.
- Don't use time or words carelessly. Neither can be retrieved. Life is not a race, but a journey to be savoured each step of the way.

As you reflect on the above points, let me encourage you to seek to do what is right, to love what is best and to trust in God who can give you what you truly need. Don't let circumstances or cynicism rob you of His peace and joy. As the Bible promises, "God is our strength and shield, an ever present help in times of trouble." (Psalm 46)

There is a big wooden cross at the roundabout at Davidson's Mains on which is written "Let's talk about Jesus". I personally got really excited when I first saw it. I still do, thankful to the people who had the courage to put it up. To build up one another can make a huge impact on a person in a situation and we are capable of doing this. That special word spoken at just the right moment can be enough to keep us going, the difference between giving up and breaking through. The comfort of a hug, the taking and holding of a hand, not forgetting the 'wee prayer' offered at the point of almost giving up and about to crumble, collapse and fall, can do wonders. In coming together relationships are formed and unforgettable conversations happen. Yes, God does use ordinary folks like you and me to touch and bring comfort to one another as we walk the pilgrim's way. What a difference can be made just by having a conversation with someone. 1Timothy 4 v6 tells us "You will be a good minister of Jesus Christ nourished in the words of faith and good doctrine which you have carefully followed."

Remember "I can do all things through Jesus Christ who strengthens me". Philippians 4 v13

Dear God, thank you for exposing our limitations so we can experience your strength. Truly we can boast in our weaknesses knowing your power works through them. Amen.

By the time you read this Christian Aid week will have passed. But you can give at any time. This is a bit of the background to Christian Aid week.

Not turning our backs Read: Acts 2:42-47

For Christian Aid supporters and staff, the month of May brings the familiar cycle of preparing for and taking part in Christian Aid Week. For many churches, it is an integral part of their calendars, a moment when they look outwards – into their own communities as members collect door-to-door, and beyond to our global neighbours overseas who struggle against the bonds of poverty, violence and injustice.

I wonder though how many people know why Christian Aid Week happens in May? This year sees the 60th anniversary of Christian Aid Week, and to celebrate, we are marking the dedication and ingenuity of some of our diamond supporters. A few of these dedicated supporters took part in that first appeal in 1957, but the tradition of churches holding an appeal in May actually goes back further to the end of the Second World War. In the latter stages of the war, a group of Christians outraged by the devastation and displacement of people in Europe came together through the British Council of Churches.

With the coming of peace, they saw an opportunity to hold an appeal on the first Sunday after VE Day to raise money for the relief and resettlement of some of those millions in Europe who were displaced and desitute. It is because of this that Christian Aid Week happens when it does — and it is the longest continually running fundraising campaign in Britain.

Reflecting on this story, I am always struck by how Christians in this country were willing to give readily and generously, despite the immense hardship that faced them locally, to aid their former enemies. A contemporary report, now in the Christian Aid archive, states how this

'gave rise to the hope of our genuine understanding and concern for [the people of Europe], and of our desire to join with them in an effort to make Christ King amidst a world in ruins.

I find a strong parallel here with the reading from Acts, where believers in Christ gave to all as they had need, and praised God, having the goodwill of all the people.

Today, as the world faces the greatest refugee crisis since 1945, it falls to our generation to respond.

What will you do with your old £1 coins?





PERFECT HARMONY CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED TO MOVE SCOTLAND'S NATIONAL MUSIC SCHOOL TO OLD ROYAL HIGH



Two of Scotland's national treasures are coming together in perfect harmony with a new campaign launched on Monday 1st May.

The *Perfect Harmony* campaign calls upon everyone in Scotland who cares about the nation's cultural and educational future to support the move of Scotland's national music school to the Old Royal High School on Calton Hill, Edinburgh.

Supported by one of the largest philanthropic arts gifts to the nation, the proposed conservation and restoration of the iconic Thomas Hamilton building as the new home of St Mary's Music School, with a state-of-the-art public concert hall and public garden, is backed by Dunard Fund. Managed through The Royal High School Preservation Trust, Dunard's exceptional gift to the nation will help protect Edinburgh's UNESCO World Heritage Site status and conserve the integrity of the neo-classical building that gave the capital the moniker, the Athens of the North.

The project, which has planning permission but is currently unable to proceed because of a rival hotel bid, will enable St Mary's Music School to position itself as a centre of youth music in the capital and significantly broaden and enhance access to music and musical education for young people throughout Scotland. It will allow the school to grow its number of pupils from 80 to 120 of Scotland's most promising young musicians, while extending its existing outreach programmes, masterclasses and workshops to more than 300 children from throughout the country.

The new 280-seat concert hall will ease the undersupply of performance space in Edinburgh and be capable of staging over 100 public performances a year, attracting audiences of over 20,000 annually and contributing approximately £110m to the Edinburgh economy over the next 30 yearsThe capital project is estimated to generate at least £22.6 million for Edinburgh with the ongoing contribution to the city's economy at around £1.6 million per year.

The campaign launched urges people throughout Scotland to show their support by writing to their MSP, MP or local councillor (if in Edinburgh), joining the facebook community and getting involved on twitter. Campaign t-shirts are available via the website, which has been set up to provide information about the campaign and supporters are encouraged to send in photos of themselves in Perfect Harmony t-shirts.

The Perfect Harmony campaign will run until a final decision is made on the future of the rival hotel development, which has already been refused planning permission by the City of Edinburgh Council. The developers now have two sets of plans on the table, the most recent of which received over 3,100 objections when made public earlier this year.

William Gray Muir, Chairman of The Royal High School Preservation Trust, said:

"The Perfect Harmony campaign builds on the public support for these two national treasures to come together and to take advantage of the incredible generosity of Dunard Fund, which has agreed to gift the funds needed to renovate and conserve the Old Royal High School for the nation.

"We want everyone to come together in a chorus of perfect harmony."




