## Christmas Hope

Critics of religion, and of Christianity in particular, have likened belief in God to belief in Santa Claus or the Tooth Fairy. It's nothing but a charming story for those with childlike belief, but now that we are adults, the critics say that that time is over.

Childish stories may lead to childish fleeting emotions or temporary wonder, and they may even inspire heart-warming ads or films. But they simply don't have the power to inspire lasting works of art that perpetuate our emotion and wonder. The paintings of the great masters, like Rembrandt's Adoration of the Shepherds, or music like Handel's Messiah, come from a message

much deeper than the secularized trappings of the modern holiday season. They come from the history of Jesus's birth and the theology of what his birth means.

The birth of peace and hope at Christmas, in the person of Jesus, does more than inspire art and language. It inspires action. In the winter of 1914, the First World War was only five months old and already about 800,000 men had been wounded or killed. On France's Western Front, British and German soldiers had been fiercely fighting. On Christmas Eve that year, they braced themselves for yet another day of bombs and bloodshed. But that day would be different from all others.

British soldiers in the trenches raised signs reading "Merry Christmas" and sang Christmas carols. Soon, they heard Christmas carols coming from the German trenches. On Christmas morning, both sides rose from their trenches and met in the middle of No Man's Land. They sang songs and engaged in conversations together. They exchanged sweets and cigars. And in one spot, they played football. Along the front the spontaneous truce continued into the next day, with neither side willing to fire the first shot. The truce ended when fresh troops arrived. Enemies, who only days before had been engaged in fierce combat, had acted as if they were brothers. If it was possible then, between World War I's horrid trenches, it is possible again.

May I suggest something rather daring? Nothing else could have inspired the Christmas truce. No secular sloganeering encouraging soldiers to stop worrying and enjoy their lives could have bridged No Man's Land's gap. No political speech and no New Age call to unity could have turned No Man's Land into a joyful-filled playground. Only the story of Hope's birth could do that, even if only for a moment. Perhaps that's why Christmas does more than just break winter's gloominess with a cup of cheer.

Jesus's birth is indeed hope's birth, which blossoms at Easter. We hint at the interaction between Christmas and Easter in the song ' $O$ Holy Night':

O holy night, the stars are brightly shining
It is the night of our dear Saviour's birth.
Long lay the world in sin and error pining,
Till he appeared and the souls felt its worth.
The thrill of hope, the weary world rejoices,
For yonder breaks a new and glorious morn.
My dear friend, Jesus didn't come into the world to give us only good words and profound examples of moral living. He came specifically to provide a rescue for every human heart, to rescue us from sin and spiritual death by paying the penalty we couldn't afford to pay ourselves. In Jesus's own words, he came into the world as God incarnate to offer himself as a rescue so that we can be saved (Mark 10:45). Christmas is not just the birth of someone whose example helped humanity. It's the birth of the One who saves humanity from itself. In a paradox of time, Easter's hope gives rise to Christmas's joy.

Of course, the world wasn't suddenly made perfect over 2000 years ago and it certainly isn't perfect now. Indeed, the Bible doesn't paint such a shallow picture for us even as it narrates Jesus's birth. His advent is surrounded by pain. The selfish and hateful King Herod wanted the Messiah exterminated so that he could remain king. And so, he ordered the deaths of children who fitted the Messiah's profile in Bethlehem. For the parents of those children, the nights before Jesus's birth were anything but silent or peaceful. And yet, in the midst of it all, God came as a child, and through Him, he offers us hope through the joy of his Son's birth.

My friend, sometimes battlefield miracles cause peace to break out. And sometimes eloquent preaching breathes through the halls of nursing homes or hospital wards. But all of that, the pain and the joy, the beauty and the ugliness, are but echoes emerging from a manger where the wordless infant carried within himself the message that God so loves the world. All of our human expressions of joy, hope, and peace are footnotes to the embodied message of the Christ-child.

Let me encourage you, in the midst of cynicism, violence, uncertainty and of it all, to have joy and peace because of the hope Jesus offers.

## FRESH START

'What you have done for me....has been outstandingly brilliant'. This is a comment from John (name changed).
Over the last two weeks, we have been working with John, who became homeless after the property owner of the furnished flat where he lived asked him to leave. Sadly, he spent the next 12 months sleeping on the couches of his friends and associates. Fortunately, he was allocated a Support Worker from the Salvation Army, who helped him to get a new tenancy from the Council. He was quite anxious about moving onto the property, telling me that 'the flat was completely bare and empty'. His support worker helped him access furniture through Bethany and made a referral to ourselves. We were able to help him with a number of our Starter Packs (e.g. bedding, towels, toiletries, a food pack, crockery, pots and pans and a microwave). We also completed the second day of his Hit Squad on Tuesday, which gave us the opportunity to paint both his living room and bedroom. Big thanks to all involved for your support.
Here's what our client Wendy had to say about her time spent with the Hit Squad 'The hit team I got were just so nice, helpful and hardworking they were very keen \& professional. After about 5 minutes of the team being in my house, I felt like I had known them for a long time. I enjoyed myself painting, they showed me new tricks of the trade I wanted to keep them. So so happy and I must say a huge thank you to Jen for putting it all together'

Thank you to everyone who generously contributes items for the Fresh Start starter packs. The impact of your donations is echoed in John's comments. The board in the hall corridor has a list of the items Fresh Start put in their starter packs and items that they particularly need for the packs just now.


Though we, as a church, concentrate on collecting items for Starter Packs, Fresh Start also provides cooking courses and growing spaces Autumn saw jams and chutneys produced at the Food Station in Harrison Place. ## Blackhall Community Trust Update Winter 2017

Blackhall Community Trust is now a Scottish charity and a company limited by guarantee. We hold three public meetings a year, have a growing membership and a thriving mailing list of residents (see below for details on how to join/support us). We are members of the Development Trusts Association Scotland.

Our next public meeting (our AGM) is on Tuesday March 6 at 7.30pm in St Columba's Small Hall. Refreshments (including home-baking) will be served.

## Community Priorities: A Community Hub, more places at Blackhall Nursery and recreational opportunities and facilities for all ages

These are exciting times - we have been approved for our City of Edinburgh Council Stage 1 Community Asset Transfer application to transfer ownership of Ravelston Park Pavilion to Blackhall Community Trust on behalf of the Blackhall community. We now move on to Stage 2. Meanwhile, we have applied for grant funding from the Scottish Land Fund for over $£ 15,000$ to support this asset transfer process. If successful, we can commission a business plan, feasibility studies, building surveys and initial designs for Ravelston Park Pavilion to ensure that it is fit for purpose for Blackhall Nursery and as a community hub.

We now run the following groups and activities, in response to requests from local residents:

- A monthly book club which meets at Blackhall Nursery, Ravelston Park Pavilion - two sessions have been held so far
- A monthly walking group - two walks have taken place, one on Corstorphine Hill and one along the Water of Leith
- A monthly coffee morning for those who are recently retired, are new to the area or feel a bit isolated and would like to connect to the community (six held so far in Cloudberry, Blackhall). Our latest coffee morning was on Thursday 30 November 10-11.30am, Cloudberry, Blackhall. If you check there or contact us we can tell you shen the next one will be - Christmas festivities changing the dates.
- A pop up café to tie in with the Blackhall School Parent Staff Association's gardening days.

Please email or write to us if you are interested in joining any of the above activities. We are very happy to look into organising other events or activities - just let us know what you would like.

Since opening in late 2014 we have helped over 1500 callers to reconnect with old interests, find new hobbies and make new friends. Often the call comes from a friend, family member or health professional looking for advice on someone else's behalf.

Blackhall and the surrounding areas are well served for activities. If you would like to join an art or knitting group, get some gentle exercise or simply meet new people for lunch or a cup of tea, give us a call and we will find something that suits your needs.

# Blackhall children receive thousands of pounds in funding this year from local sports committee 

The Blackhall Children's Sports Committee (BCSC) has been in existence for over 100 years. It was formed in 1909 as a voluntary, non-profit, organisation with the aim of promoting and organising children's sports and activities in our own community. Now in 2017 it's just as relevant to the community as it was then, encouraging grassroots activity in sports and helping our community stay fit and healthy.

In 2017, the BCSC awarded almost $£ 6,000$ in sports funding to the community. Children who benefit from the awards range from toddlers right up to senior school level. The types of sports funded this year include climbing, swimming, table tennis, athletics, fencing, hockey, netball, tennis, sailing, badminton, outdoor camping, tumble tots and yoga. Preference is given to funding for equipment and coaching fees.

Nine local children received funding this year to assist them in their chosen sport, totalling $£ 1,525$. An average award of $£ 169$ per individual.

Most of the funding goes towards local groups where the benefit is spread across a wider number of people. This year nine local groups received funding for sporting and healthy activities for children in Blackhall, totalling £4,160. An average award is about $£ 462$ per group. Groups supported this year are Blackhall Primary School, Blackhall Athletic Football Club, Blackhall Playgroup, Blackhall Mothers and Toddlers Group, Blackhall Tennis Club, Blackhall Girl Guides and Blackhall School Netball Team.

Last year Blackhall Primary School received funding from the BCSC for the purchase and installation of a climbing wall, matting and a basketball ball hoop in the school playground. The wall and the hoop are very well used by the school children and a great addition to the play area.

## CARD or DECORATION

Draw half a Christmas tree opposite the fold. Cut along the line and you will have 2 identical trees. Fold the trees in half, very lightly, hardly creasing the centre line to mark the centre of the tree.
Cut a slit along the bottom half of the centre of one tree and along the top half of the centre

of the other tree. Slip the two trees together along the slits. To help the tree to stand firmly, use sticky tape to fasten the parts together where they meet.

Decorate the tree. If you are using it as a card then leave an area free
 of decorations so that you can write on it.

## Sheila Sinclair

- an appreciation

Regular Bulletin readers may have turned to this page for our crossword. Sadly there is no crossword as our crossword compiler, Sheila Sinclair, died on $18^{\text {th }}$ August.

I had the privelege of knowing Sheila for five years when she e- mailed the Crossword to me, always on time and ready to insert. I knew her as friendly, bright, witty, helpful and reliable lady who loved language and with whom I shared a love of North Berwick where Sheila stayed latterly. But I learned that there was much more to our crossword compiler than her love of crosswords and quizzes. I thought it fitting that we used this space to share her other talents with you.

Sheila was born in Edinburgh and, after attending Flora Stevenson's and Broughton High School she passed her Civil Service exam and began working in the Post Office. As with many civil servants, her job took her round the country, including St Albans and London. Sheila was very much a people person and when Post Office Telecommunications became BT she
used her people skills to help many employees prepare for redundancy before deciding to make herself redundant. This meant she could return to Scotland where she worked in a consultancy in Leith for ten years.

1990 saw her move to North Berwick where her skills were put to use in many ways. She was chair of the community council (also editing their newsletter!) where she led by example; her tireless enthusiasm and sense of humour helped her get others involved and get things done. North Berwick has won the Coastal Town title, awarded by Britain in Bloom, nine times, before being awarded the RHS Rose Bowl in 2016.

Sheila was also the Honorary Secretary of the East Lothian Community Rail Partnership and campaigned for the reinstatement of the public toilets at North Berwick, making an arrangement for rail passengers to use the facilities of a local gallery while waiting for action to be taken. Sadly, this improvement was not realised before her death. However she did arrange for the R.L. Stevenson poem From a Railway Carriage, which was written on a train
journey to North Berwick, to be put on display at the station there.

Sheila had a very positive outlook and attitude and was honoured earlier this year with the Rotary International Award for outstanding service to North Berwick. Over the years she had raised in excess of $£ 30,000$ for good causes, much of it through quizzes she compiled (every bit as difficult as the crosswords !).

Sheila loved words and language and used her linguistic skill for good for so many. Our thoughts go out to her sister Norma and her family.
