MINISTER'S FOOD FOR THOUGHT

The Glorious Paradox of Easter

PARADOX



“I shall not die, but I shall live, and recount the deeds of the LORD. The stone which the builders rejected has become the head of the corner. This is the LORD's doing; it is marvellous in our eyes.” (Psalm 118:17-23)

Dear Friends,

Easter! For most of us is a glorious day of rejoicing in the miraculous; a day where we reflect not only the resurrection of Jesus Christ over 2,000 years ago, but also our own spiritual resurrections in our own lives. The day when, through penitential prayer, our faith in Jesus Christ has brought us the assurance of forgiveness of sin and eternal life. A glorious and wonderful gift and hope!

For others, however, Easter will only serve as a reminder of their cross. You'll feel like you got left behind at Good Friday, weeping, while the rest of the world moves on to Easter Sunday. You wish you could celebrate, but you don't know how. You may even apologise to God for your sadness and lack of excitement.

You're not alone. As your Minister, over the last months, I've watched several Good Fridays and Easters play out in the lives of those among us. Happy occasions when shouts of rejoicing and praises were sung to God. Yet, side by side, illnesses, adversity, disappointments and death have occurred uncomfortably close to these joyful events.

The truth is, most of life is like this. Happiness, overshadowed by occasions of sadness, is ever present and never far away.

So how do we deal with this reality? How do we deal with Good Friday and Easter coexisting?

I think we start with recognising that the first Easter, the real Easter, was not just one event in time that occurred long ago. Christ's resurrection spanned the ages and has eternal consequences. It applies to you and me today just as much as it did to Christ's followers on Easter morning. It also / continued

It also applies to the future. Our hope, no matter where we may be today, is in the transforming truth of Easter.

Second, I think we need to remember that true faith in God does not rely on our emotions. If you cry on Easter morning because life has been wearing you down, God still accepts you. His love for you is undiminished and ever faithful. In fact, He died and rose for you so that he could more closely walk with you through these hard times. He knows, more than anyone, the heaviness and immensity of the cross.

Third, I think we need to remember that as awe-struck as Christ's first followers felt after his resurrection, they still didn't know what it fully meant... for humanity or for their personal lives. While the resurrection brought their beloved Lord back to them, He was different now. The resurrection simultaneously healed some wounds while raising a new set of questions, insecurities, fears, and even pain - at least temporarily.


Ultimately, all Good Fridays will lead to joyful Easter mornings if we cling to Christ. Whether you are in a season of hardship, rejoicing, or a mix of both, the key is to keep walking in faith one step at a time. Only the Risen Christ can guide us through the foggy path of life. And when our final Easter morning arrives, we'll finally see with clarity that the journey was worth it and glorious!

Wherever you are in life, whether on an Easter Sunday or Good Friday experience, may the Risen Lord be your comfort and joy. He died and rose for you!

By now everyone in the congregation will be aware that we have voted by a majority of just over two to one to go ahead with the plans for Building for the Future. You should have received a letter giving the details of the vote and

outlining in general terms what the next steps are. Although the aim is certainly to complete the whole project encompassing both the sanctuary and the halls, we will be proceeding in stages as the practicalities and the funding allow. The first phase will be to work on the sanctuary and the architect has been asked to develop the plans for this phase with a view to submitting them for planning permission. At the same time, the funding sub group will be considering how to proceed with this important part of the project. Because of the timing of this edition of Kirk News, there is nothing further to add just now but we will be trying to keep the congregation fully informed at every stage.

A Note from the Director of Music

It was with great pleasure and a sense of privilege that I received an invitation from the Kirk Session to become the new Director of Music at Blackhall St Columba's Church.

Having been brought up in the Ravelston area and moving in the 1980s to Craigcrook Avenue then March Road with my family I have known the church for many years. Indeed I attended John Kitchen's inauguration of the organ in 2006 and was impressed with the ability of the new young organist, Angus Tully. I was also aware of the history of a very competent choir which sang every week which I recognised was a commitment that was quite unusual in the modern day.



I became a Christian in my teens and was involved in playing piano and organ around Charlotte Baptist Chapel for several years before being appointed Director of Music, a post I held for 26 years including the transition from Rose Street to the very impressive St George's West Church at Shandwick Place. The Lewis 3 manual pipe organ there encouraged me to take a greater interest in playing the organ but when I saw the advert placed with the Edinburgh Society of Organists, for the St Columba's post I did not think I had the technical skills to meet the expectations of a church where classical music had played such a significant role.

However, I submitted my application and with my wife Libby, we were excited to hear the church was looking to develop new forms of music and expand the range of instruments used in worship in order to broaden the appeal for involvement of a new generation and raise the profile of the church in the community.

I am aware I come from a very different Christian culture but it is my intention to be sensitive to the needs of those who love the English cathedral repertoire while striving to make the songs we sing week by week relevant to today's generation. Whatever musical style we use my aim will be the same: ***to glorify God and build up the members of the church (1Pet 4:11 & Eph 4:11-12)***. Music has a great ability to soften hearts / continued

to soften hearts and to influence our emotional state. My intention in whatever we do in the future, therefore, will be to use the music to prepare the congregation to hear what God has to say throughout the singing and the spoken word.

There are many very good modern songs which the church should be using and there are many more which should never have seen the light of day! However, it is interesting to note that Charles Wesley wrote 8,989 hymns yet the Christian church only sings around 40 of them. The flood of new music has not passed through the filters of time and musical criticism yet so we need to be selective at this stage and only seek out material that adds to our sense of the presence of Christ in our service. Libby and I invited the choir to our home to chat through some ideas and look at some of the new songs that we might sing. 20 members managed to come along and we had good food followed by a run through a number of new songs which we might consider using as congregational songs in due course. It was good to meet “offline” and it is something we shall repeat.

It is too early for me to say what my plans are since I am very much in the listening stage of the post, but in general terms, I am certain there are many members of this great church who play orchestral and other instruments to a reasonable standard. Listening to the singing on a Sunday morning I am also confident there are many very able singers in St Columba's. While many cannot give time for weekly involvement I am keen that we provide everyone with the opportunity to use whatever musical gifts they have in the service of the God whom we worship together. Exactly what that will look like, I am as interested to see as you will be but I am excited at the opportunity and challenge you have given me and I trust I will be able to serve you as we all seek to deepen and strengthen our Christian walk.

Please do not hesitate to introduce yourself to Libby or me on a Sunday and forgive us if our memories do not enable us to recall names immediately.

Feel free to contact me if you have any thoughts on music in the church or would like to be involved in any way.

KIRK SESSION REPORT

The Kirk Session met on Tuesday 20 February and 13 March 2018.

Blackhall Bulletin Distribution

In view of issues regarding the distribution of the Blackhall Bulletin it has been agreed that from later this year and for a trial period of one year the magazine will be delivered by the Royal Mail. Hamish Mair, Convener of the Communications Committee, advised that the cost of this exercise would be fully funded by a benefactor.

Building For The Future

It was confirmed to Session that members voted on the proposal that *'the Kirk Session should proceed with the plans for development as outlined in the Congregational meeting on 27 January 2018'* as follows:-

Yes 278. No 128. Abstentions 8. Total votes cast was 414.

Therefore the Congregational vote endorsed the decision of the Kirk Session to agree outline approval for the Project.

Session noted that the Steering Group had acknowledged that there would need to be some degree of phasing within the overall project but we would be embarking on the entire scheme. The nature and pace of the phasing would depend not just on practical issues but also on funding as it becomes available. It was also agreed that we should begin with the Sanctuary, although it was acknowledged that it may be advantageous to consider some details relating to the halls at the same time.

It is recognised that the Large Hall will have to be used for worship while the Sanctuary is out of commission and that it will have to be smartened up before this happens.

It was further noted we can only embark on work with the requisite approvals and with the necessary funding in place. On that basis Session agreed that:-

1. Work should begin in the Sanctuary with limited work in the Large Hall.
2. The overall project would be carried out in phases.
3. An updating letter would go out to the Congregation.

Church Crèche

Session was advised that Alison Torrance had intimated her decision to 'retire' from running the Church Crèche. It was noted that Alison had been involved with the Crèche for 30 years and she has advised that she would be pleased to serve on a future rota of people running the Crèche.

Communication

Letters from each of Mary's Meals, St Columba's Hospice and Scripture Union Scotland acknowledging receipt of funds from the Christmas Services amounting to £522.40 each.

Data Protection / continued

Data Protection

It was noted that there are still a number of forms to be returned by members. To comply with new legislation coming into play from May it is necessary for the Church to hold a consent form from each member.

Defibrillator

Following a presentation by Betty Watt regarding the merits of having a defibrillator on site, Session agreed that we should look to having one in the Halls area and another in the Sanctuary. Enquiries are being made regarding the sourcing of external funding to acquire the two items.

Family & Children's Worker

Session approved the appointment of a Family & Children's Worker last year and subsequently we identified a suitable person but regrettably that person had in between times secured another position. We are currently working on an application to The Church of Scotland Go For It Fund for part funding and seeking out what can be sourced from The Dean Trust and Presbytery funds. It remains the intention to appoint a person into this role in recognition of the changing demographics of the parish and to encourage more young families into the Church. This would, initially at least, be a three year appointment.

Monthly Sunday Evening Service

The Minister advised that he plans to introduce, in early course, a new evening Service.

Offerings

Session agreed that Motor Neurone Research would receive the proceeds from the retiring offering at the February Communion Services with North West Carers Centre being the beneficiary of the next offering and Edinburgh Headway and YMCA being subsequent recipients.

Pirie Mission Partnership Group

Andrew Walls addressed Session to advise that at a meeting of the members of this group in January, it was felt that the 'partnership' had run its course. Over the years, £17,000 had been sent out and used to build the Hall at Dimbaza in the Eastern Cape of South Africa. Malusi Kashe, Pirie's Session Clerk, was contacted about this decision, and thanked us for our contribution to the Partnership.

The annual Quiz Night will be held in May with the proceeds split equally between Christian Aid and the Building for the Future project.

Having heard Andrew's report, Session agreed with the proposal to disband this relationship. Session acknowledged the role that George and Margaret McArthur had played in establishing the link with Pirie.

Memories of Billy Graham in Scotland

The congregation might be interested to know that our church building, specifically the stained glass windows in the North Aisle, was recently used as a backdrop to an interview I was asked to give to celebrate Billy Graham. The BBC were seeking people who had memories of the All Scotland Crusade in 1955.

At that time I was a young student at Edinburgh University. Like many others I went for training as a counsellor with a very good friend from schooldays. Training was given by Rev D.P. Thomson, Evangelist of the Church of Scotland and an outstanding figure in our church history. We also had individual interviews about our own Christian experience.

When the Crusade started, we each went to an allocated building in Edinburgh where relays were being given of the nightly meetings in the Kelvin Hall in Glasgow and when Dr Graham gave his call for commitment each of us stood by one of those 'going forward' and then helped them in their expressed desire to invite Jesus into their lives and become believing Christians. They were also encouraged to become part of a congregation and were given a booklet, 'The Way Ahead'.

Some were already church members who for the first time were finding personal faith.

Then there was the big rally at Tynecastle football ground, given free for the occasion, an unforgettable experience when large numbers committed themselves to follow Christ.

It was all a wonderful time for the churches in Scotland. People were openly talking about faith and there was the story of the workman up a ladder whistling 'Blessed Assurance'! It's also important to remember that the Crusade was part of a General Assembly-backed movement called 'Tell Scotland'. I'll write about that next time.

So as the interviewers and the camera man stood beside me in St Columba's a few weeks ago, I was recalling things far back in my mind. Of course some others are being interviewed as well. A lot will doubtless be cut - hopefully the requested solo of one verse of 'Just as I am'!!




JESUS IS ALIVE!
