Then the police enquired if we had a car in the Palace and when we told him that we wanted a taxi, he went out and flagged one down and directed him into the Palace grounds (taxi driver thought he had done something wrong being directed into Buckingham Palace by an armed Police Officer!)

Other highlights included a delicious lunch at the Shard, seeing the musical 'Kinky Boots', going to Madame Tussauds as well as travelling to and from London first class by train.

Congratulations to Julie MacPherson of Blackhall (left, below) who recently represented Scotland in the Commonwealth Games at the Gold Coast. Here are a few of her thoughts about the experience.



I have just returned from the Gold Coast having represented Scotland in badminton at the Commonwealth Games. This was my first Commonwealth Games and it was an amazing experience to be part of a multi-sport event in which Scots get to compete under the Scotland flag.

Four years ago in Glasgow I was part of the Achieve programme which is for young athletes who have the potential to get picked for the next Commonwealth Games. This allowed us to go and watch different sports and visit the athletes' village which gave me a great insight to the atmosphere and bond that Team Scotland have, so it was an amazing feeling to be part of the team for Gold Coast.

I played in both the team and individual events. Scotland reached the quarter-finals of the team event losing out to Malaysia, the eventual silver medallists. In the individual events, I lost to strong English opponents who also went on to win silver. Despite these losses, I gained a wealth of experience by playing former Olympic. World and Commonwealth medallists. I'm now back in training again for the next one in Birmingham 2022!

## **Beginning with a Question**

Whether in an exam paper or job interview, beginning with a question seems a proper place to start. It helps to bring a sharper focus, it's conversational, it reveals gaps in knowledge, and it's quite natural.



Children seem to use questions instinctively to find out more about our world and everyday life. Of course, there are lazy questions and there are thoughtful and profound questions. The difference is hard to explain, but anyone who has ever heard or asked a great question, asked at the right time, will immediately know why good, careful, thoughtful questions are always worth asking.

When it comes to questions about faith, Christians have often pointed to the example of God asking Adam and Eve, *Where are you?* (Genesis 3:9), and the way in which Jesus interacts with people in the New Testament. Here are just a few of the questions of Jesus:

What are you looking for? What do you want me to do for you? Have I been with you for so long a time and you still do not know me? If you love only those who love you, what credit is that to you? Do you want to be well? Do you see this woman? What good is it to gain the whole world but forfeit your soul? Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing? Who is greater, the one seated at the table, or the one who serves? Do you think that I have come to establish peace on the earth? Which of you would hand his son a stone when he asks for a loaf of bread, or a snake when he asks for a fish? How can you believe, when you accept praise from one another and do not seek the praise that comes from the only God? Did I not tell you that if you believe you will see the glory of God? Why do you call me 'Lord, Lord,' but do not do what I command? Why do you break the commandment of God for the sake of your tradition? For which of these good works are you trying to stone me? Do you think that I cannot call upon my Father and he will not provide me at this moment with more than twelve legions of angels? Would you like some breakfast? Have you come to believe because you have seen me? I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this? Do you love me?

Perhaps starting with questions isn't such a bad idea after all, is it? Even so, some may be suspicious or reluctant of starting with questions. Some may find them leading or loaded. But, as you can see, Jesus used questions, which, for me, is the strongest reason to use them.

Time and time again, when Jesus asked a question it suddenly brought everything into focus, not just for the one he was asking, but for everyone listening as well. His questions were and are personal, direct, challenging and certainly demanding. Indeed, His questions demand, from everyone, a response, so that everyone can see more clearly the motives, behaviours, assumptions, and all the harshness that often rages under the surface. Questions can help us to concentrate, pay attention, and think together. A good question can transform a frustrating discussion into a life-changing moment, when reality breaks through ignorance or illusion.

In these moments, when we gently ask the right questions of others or ourselves we can sometimes get under a question, and meet the one behind it. In the words of *T.S. Eliot*, "Oh my soul, be prepared for the coming of the Stranger. Be prepared for him who knows how to ask questions."

My dear friend, the message of Jesus continues to come in power, reality and compassion and is able to answer the deeper questions that come bursting out when the door is opened. Today, maybe, like so many others, you have many questions and you are seeking for answers. Let me encourage you to draw near to Him and let Him bring you to a place of certainty and assurance. He knows who you are and every detail of your life, including your doubts.

As you draw near to Him, also be prepared that He Himself will ask of you, one or two questions which will demand from you an answer and a response. I wonder, what will you say and what will you do?

Since the previous edition of the Blackhall Bulletin went to press the congregation has voted to embark on the Building for the Future project and the Kirk Session has authorised the steering group to take the next steps.

The aim is very much to complete the whole project encompassing both the sanctuary and the halls but, of course, there are both practical and financial implications to this. Leaving aside the financial ones for the moment, it is clear that we could not have both the sanctuary and the halls out of commission at the same time. We will therefore be doing the work on the sanctuary as phase 1.

The architect is currently working on developing more detailed plans, for the work to be done on the sanctuary. This is quite a lengthy process and will involve more consultation with the steering group to take account of ideas, which they and members of the congregation have put forward. When the specifications have been agreed the architects will prepare documents for submission for planning permissions and building warrants and of course, authority from the Presbytery and Church Head Office to go ahead. When all that is completed tender documents will have to be prepared and the tender process itself will have to be gone through. Only after all that can we expect to see any physical work being done.

Of course, all of this is dependent on our being able to raise the money for the project and the fund-raising sub-committee has already been planning for this. By the time this edition of the Bulletin goes out the fund-raising process will have been launched at an event on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> of May. As previously indicated, the sale of Church House and a significant number of pledges already received mean that the campaign is off to a very good start. Given this, there is every reason to hope that we will be able to get the necessary funds and permissions to start phase 1 as soon as the plans have been fully developed and also to hope that phase 2 can follow relatively soon afterwards.

We are embarking on an exciting stage in the church's history and, although there is bound to be some disruption along the way, the end result is an enticing prospect. Although the process itself is about bricks and mortar the underlying purpose is all about the church community and hopefully it can help to bring everyone together in a shared enterprise, including not only the congregation as such but also all those who use or visit the halls. There will be regular updates in the Blackhall Bulletin to keep you abreast of what is happening.

# Our next public meeting is on Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> June at 7.30pm in the Small Hall of Blackhall St Columba's Church. Everyone is very welcome.

Thank you very much to residents who took part in our public consultation on five possible site options for a new Ravelston Park Pavilion. We were really pleased with the interest and expressions of support we received at our public meetings and exhibitions as well as through our online survey.

Overall, consultees preferred Option 4, a location close to the existing building which would provide enough space for a community hub and a fit-for-purpose home for Blackhall Nursery. This location would also enable Blackhall Nursery to continue to operate during construction. The findings are currently being collated and will form a detailed options appraisal. Our business plan will then be developed based on the final option. Of course, planning permission has yet to be sought and this will provide another opportunity for local people to share their views. More information on our next steps will be available at our public meeting on Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> June.

Blackhall Community Trust membership has increased dramatically during the consultation – thank you for this demonstration of your support. Our next newsletter will include the membership form again so please consider joining us.

**Blackhall Community Trust (BCT) continues to organise a number of activities. The Book Club** meets in Ravelston Park Pavilion on the first Thursday of every month. **The BCT walking group** now goes on monthly walks. Blackhall Nursery is situated within the wonderful nature resource of Ravelston Park and Woods. At Blackhall Nursery, we put the children at the heart of everything we do. We provide a safe, healthy and happy environment where children grow and develop through play and active learning.

Summer term is always a very busy time in Nursery and so far the children have had thoroughly enjoyable outings to Gorgie City Farm where they met the goats, piglets, sheep and cows, as well as the tortoise and bearded dragon! Thanks to the funding we received from the Blackhall Children's Sports Committee, we have been able to provide the children with Tennis & Ball Skills lessons which helped greatly in developing their balance and eye-hand coordination as well as allowing them to practise their throwing and catching skills. The summer term brings more opportunities for our 'Tuesday Trot' around Ravelston Park which helps towards promoting a healthy and active lifestyle. The children have been eager to continue with the Tuesday Trot in all weathers throughout the Winter months and they are now managing to complete many laps of the Park – Bravo!

Our health promotion will continue throughout June as the Blue, Yellow, Green and Red Teams compete against each other at the Nursery Sports Day, followed by a cuppa for adults and an ice cream cone for the children. By the end of term, the children's excitement will reach new heights as they take part in different sports activities, such as football, dancing, judo, Enjoy-a-Ball and parachute games during our Health Fortnight. By then we will all be ready for the summer holidays!

Blackhall Nursery is a registered Scottish charity working in partnership with the City of Edinburgh Council. We offer places in morning and afternoon classes, providing sessions of 3 hours 10 minutes for 3-5 year olds during term time. We are a feeder nursery for Blackhall Primary School and **all places are free and funded by the City of Edinburgh Council**. We are currently in discussions with the City of Edinburgh Council regarding being part of a pilot scheme to deliver 1140 hours of free early learning and childcare (up to six hours a day, term time only) from August 2018. The nature of this pilot scheme means that the Nursery will only be able to offer these extended hours to a small number of children.

The summer months are when the 'horti' members relax in their gardens, and ensure that greater Blackhall is kept green and colourful. However it would fair to say time is also spent visiting other gardens locally and further afield. One of the enjoyable local garden openings is in Trinity, and is organised by Wardie Parish Church; being close to the Botanics one can guarantee at least one of the gardens being opened belongs to a Garden staff member thus ample free advice available. What to grow each year is tricky as one can never guess what the summer or winter weather will be like. Are you aware that there are now more vegetable seeds sold than flower seeds? Growing vegetables is always fun and there are numerous varieties of decorative vegetables as well as those we Parsley Moss Curled



grow for consumption. Consider the puckered leaves of Parsley Moss Curled. Parsley is an easy herb to grow and as well as its attractive leaf structure it has the benefit of being used widely in the kitchen and as a medicinal herb for various conditions such as osteoporosis and rheumatoid arthritis. Parsley also strengthens the immune system and can give relief to indigestion. Another vegetable with attractive foliage is Swiss Chard; its thick stalks can be yellow,

red or green. The health benefits of Swiss Chard include its high fibre content as well as

its high levels of magnesium, iron and potassium. The leaves can be blanched, steamed or stir-fried; the stalks are great on pizza and in soups, sauces and stews. Chop and mix Swiss chard leaves and stems with early spring greens for a simple salad. This season I am growing a dwarf French bean called Purple Teepee, and although the main feature is the culinary use of the purple pods, which are held well above the leaves, I chose it because of its decorative value.



At time of writing our programme of talks for 2018-19 has not been finalised although our first meeting of the autumn to spring will be a social get together on Monday 10<sup>th</sup> September and our meetings continue monthly on the second Monday of the month until May.
