THE ROYAL HIGH SCHOOL HAS BEEN IN BARNTON FOR 50 YEARS

In May 1968 the Royal High School moved from the famous site at Regent Road into purpose-built accommodation tucked away behind the gardens of East Barnton Avenue. The old building had become cramped, had no PE or playing fields, technical or other practical facilities. It was time to change, not only buildings but also attitudes. Some of you will also know that by 1973 the Royal High at Barnton was admitting girls. I expect that some of you reading this will be amongst those trail blazers, and we would love you to make yourself known so that we can publicise this too!

Many of you in the community will yourself have been pupils with us here in Barnton, you may have had children through the school, and I know some of you have had grandchildren through our school.

I'm writing this piece to let you know some of the ways in which we plan to mark this 50th anniversary and to invite you to take part in or support some of our ventures.

The Need for Excellence

I don't know whether you agree with me or not, but 'Mediocrity' is fast becoming the buzzword of our times. Indeed, every imaginable excuse is now used to make it acceptable, hopefully preferred. Budget cuts, time deadlines, majority opinion, and hard-nosed practicality are outshouting and outrunning excellence.



Those forces seem to be winning the race. Incompetence and status quo averages are held up as all we can now expect, and the tragedy is that more and more people have virtually agreed. Why worry over the small detail? Why bother with the genuine now that the artificial looks so real? If the public buys it, why worry?

To make it painfully plain, why think clearly since most people want someone else to think for them? Why live differently in a society where it's so much easier to look the same and follow the crowd? Why fight fiercely when so few seem to care? Why stand courageously if it means risking ridicule, misunderstanding, or being considered a dreamer by some and a fool by others?

Why, indeed? To quote King David (the shepherd boy who wrote psalm 23 among others), "Is there not a cause?" (1 Samuel 17:28-30). Must we wait for someone else to establish our standard or to set our pace? Are we going to settle for others to dictate our lives without thinking and enquiring whether life is worth living? What is right, truth and a sense of morality, faith and ethical living? Absolutely not! On the contrary, it is my firm conviction and belief that those who impact, influence and reshape the world are the ones committed to living above the level of mediocrity. There are still too many opportunities for excellence, too much demand for uniqueness, to be satisfied with just getting by and settle for less.

Excellence is a difficult concept to communicate because it can easily be misread as neurotic perfectionism or snobbish sophistication. But it is neither. On the contrary, it is the substance of which greatness is made. It is the difference between just getting by and soaring, that which sets apart the significant from the superficial, the lasting from the temporary, the mundane from the meaningful, the impermanent from the eternal.

A commitment to excellence is neither popular nor easy. But it is essential. Excellence in integrity and morality as well as ethics and scholarship. Excellence in physical fitness and spiritual fervour just as much as excellence in relationships, workmanship and professionalism.

Let me illustrate the point: As most of you know, the name *Stradivarius* is synonymous with fine violins. This is true because *Antonius Stradivarius* insisted that no instrument constructed in his shop be sold until it was as near perfection as human care and skill could make it.

Stradivarius observed, "God needs violins to send His music into the world, and if any violins are defective God's music will be spoiled." His work philosophy was summed up in one sentence: "Other men will make other violins, but no man shall make a better one."

Likewise, in a world where minds and lives are being squeezed into a mediocrity mould which settles for averageness and the blind but erroneous acceptance that, we are okay and have it all. Let us break from this false and dangerous thinking and seek for excellence. Let us start using our minds to think the right things for the right reason. In the words of the apostle Paul who said:

"Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things. Those things, which ye have both learned, and received, and heard, and seen in me, do: and the God of peace shall be with you." (Philippians 4:8-9)

Let me encourage you to seek the best you can be and to let God, through Jesus, fulfil His good and perfect purposes for your life. He is after all, the 'Perfect One,' who in the final analysis does appraise our excellence.

There has been great progress on the building for the future project since the last issue of the Bulletin. As at the end of July when editing this issue of the Blackhall Bulletin begins, we can say that we have made a tremendous start to the fundraising campaign, which has reached a total of £1,033,417.

As is well known, no permissions will be given until all the necessary funding has been secured but we can now be pretty confident of raising the amount needed for phase 1 quite soon and we hope that this excellent start will encourage others to give us their support as well. At the launch meeting, the Treasurer has stressed that donations of any size, whether made by one-off payments, standing orders (which can be monthly over a period of up to 5 years) pledges of annual payments or, indeed, in any other form will be very much appreciated. All donations will be acknowledged and only the treasurer himself and the gift aid convener will know how much any individual has given or pledged.

In essence, we need £1.1 million for phase 1 and the same again for phase 2. Phase 1 will include everything to do with the Sanctuary including new doors from Queensferry and Columba Roads, new heating, lighting, electrics, sound system and so on.

It was always going to be necessary to phase the project, not just for financial reasons but because we will have to use the large hall for worship during the time when the Sanctuary is out of commission. However, as soon as the full amount of funding has been secured for phase 1, we will continue the process to build up funds for Phase 2. Ideally, this would allow us to start work on phase 2 as soon as phase 1 is completed but that is still some way into the future.

With all this in mind, work has been continuing behind the scenes; indeed, it has been gathering pace. Members of the Steering Group have met with the architect to refine the original brief. This led to further meetings with the architect, structural engineer and services engineer and work has now begun on more detailed surveys for phase 1. These are needed in order to move on to the next stage of the design and development process, which will enable us to apply for approval in principle from the Church and from the local authority planning department.

We have also embarked on more detailed planning as to how to move things forward in practical terms. It is a big undertaking with a number of different aspects to it and we are very fortunate indeed that Fay Stirling, within just a few weeks of retiring from professional involvement in project management, has agreed to take on this particular project and she will be working very closely with Jim Bishop, the Fabric Convener, who is heading the team.


There are many variables in the programme that will affect when we can start and how long it will take. Some of these are in our own hands, such as the fund raising, but we will have little control over the process of getting permissions from the various bodies involved. That said, the architect's current indicative programme would envisage work possibly starting on site in April 2019 with a view to it being completed by Christmas that year.

There is a long way to go before we can be sure that that timetable might be met but it is exciting that so much is actually happening and with the help of the whole congregation and others involved with Blackhall St Columba's it is not unrealistic.

Blackhall Community Trust Update Autumn 2018

We are delighted to report that steady progress is being made with our plans to create new spaces for Blackhall Nursery and for the community within a revitalised Ravelston Park Pavilion.

The community consultation earlier this year overwhelmingly supported a new build; after much testing of options, we now have a footprint and a preferred site for the new build, primarily on the site of the existing building. We will share the preliminary design for this again at our October public meeting (details below).

BLACKHALL NURSERY NEWS AUTUMN TERM




Blackhall Nursery is situated within the wonderful nature resource of Ravelston Park and Woods. At Blackhall Nursery, we put the children at the heart of everything we do. We provide a safe, healthy and happy environment where children grow and develop through play and active learning.

The past few weeks have seen the children settling into the new routines of Nursery and building new friendships. As always, our focus is on learning through play and we will be listening to and consulting with the children to ensure that learning experiences are built around their current interests.

We are very proud of our long-standing commitment to the Eco Schools Scotland programme and to have been awarded five Green Flags over the years. Taking care of the environment is embedded in our curriculum and our new children in Nursery are learning the words to our Eco Song that helps them understand what tasks they can do on Fridays for our 'Eco jobs', such as, recycling, composting, watering the plants and feeding the birds. This term the children will give their views about their Nursery by drawing pictures for our 'Let's talk about our Nursery' evaluation floorbook. We are also looking forward to our Woodland Walks in Ravelston Woods where the children will be able to explore the great outdoors and begin observing the changes that occur in nature throughout the year.

Blackhall Nursery is a registered Scottish charity working in partnership with the City of Edinburgh Council. We offer places in morning and afternoon classes, providing sessions of 3 hours 10 minutes for 3-5 year olds during term time. We are a feeder nursery for Blackhall Primary School and **all places are free and funded by the City of Edinburgh**Council. We are currently working with the City of Edinburgh Council as part of a pilot scheme to deliver 1140 hours of free early learning and childcare (up to six hours a day, term time only). The nature of this pilot scheme means that the Nursery will only be able to offer these extended hours to a small number of children.




Mystery at Magpie Manor Review



THE WAY I SEE IT: What is 'health'?

Canon David Winter considers what it is to be healthy



This summer we've been celebrating the 70th anniversary of the National Health Service. I can recall, years ago, my GP pointing out that it was the National *Health* Service, not the

National Illness Service. This was when our local practice changed its name from 'Medical Centre' to 'Health Centre'. It seems a pedantic point, but in fact it touches on a huge issue - What is 'health'?

In the Gospels the healing miracles of Jesus are sometimes called 'cures' and sometimes 'making well or whole'. These are attempts by the translators to convey a difference in the nature of what had happened. People who had 'conditions' (blind, lame, infirm) were 'cured'. Those with serious illness were often said to be 'made whole'. When Jesus was faced with ten people with leprosy, nine were described as 'cured' and one – the Samaritan who came back in gratitude, was 'made whole' (Luke 17:19). So was the woman with a long-term haemorrhage, who touched the hem of the Lord's garment: 'your faith has made you whole (well)' (Luke 8:45).

This suggests that 'health' is more than being free of sickness. Indeed, it seems to imply that health relates to *our whole life experience* – to be truly healthy, we are 'well' mentally, physically and spiritually. I think I would go further: I have ministered to people who were desperately ill but in the deepest sense of the word radiantly 'healthy'. That may sound odd, but just as 'peace' is not simply the absence of war, so 'health' is not just the absence of illness. I suspect many of those working in the NHS know the truth of that.

What an apple might do for you

Here's some good news: an apple a day could help keep diabetes at bay, according to new health guidelines.

Yoghurt, cheese and regular cups of tea or coffee are among other food and drinks that could also help ward off the condition. But keep an eye on the meat and potatoes – they may actually increase your likelihood of diagnosis.

The dietary advice comes from Oxford University and Diabetes UK. It also suggests eating more wholegrains and fruit and vegetables.

Keep your brain healthy

Here's an excellent reason to get regular exercise: women who are fit at 50 are five times less likely to get dementia.

A Swedish study found that middle age is the key time for people to take steps to promote their brain health. And boosting your exercise does not have to mean major exertion – just try a brief jog, or a brisk walk with friends. Doctors suggested that the best way to maintain good brain health was to eat a balanced diet, maintain a healthy weight, not smoke, and keep blood pressure and cholesterol in check.

Why not try a Sudoku to keep those brain cells working?

In the now and beyond

Ten years after the release of the original, *Mamma Mia! Here We Go Again* wonderfully takes us back to the same beautiful island and glorious sunshine. But perhaps it is the difference between the two films that is particularly powerful. The first was primarily themed around discovering one's individual identity and freedom, whereas the sequel explores the enduring nature of relationships.

This is symbolised physically in the hotel which Sophie has renovated to fulfil the vision of her mother, Donna, who has recently died. We see in flash-back the young Donna singing 'I Have a Dream' as she wanders through the original ruins, intercut with shots of Sophie's completed rooms.



It is symbolised relationally by the arrival of Sophie's estranged grandmother, who has not forgotten her family, and who herself discovers a long-lost love at the hotel.

But it is a scene in the beautiful hill-top church which most powerfully takes this theme to a whole new level—physically, relationally, and spiritually. Even Mark Kermode, the hardened film-critic says of it 'I wasn't just crying, I was convulsing with tears.' Here, the film reworks the lyrics of ABBA's little-known 'My Love, My Life' to change it from a song about ending relationships to one about their enduring nature: 'I can see it all so clearly, all I love so dearly... I know I don't possess you, with all my heart God bless you ... As one are we, in the now and beyond'.



In our culture, recently dominated by a focus on individuality and freedom, perhaps reflecting on this film, and its changes to the song's lyrics, might cause us to think again about the enduring nature of relationships. And, perhaps we may then heed some of the other reworked words: 'I see a road ahead, I never thought I would dare to tread'.

Climate Change

The Responding to Climate Change Project aims to provide answers and resources to these and related topics through its work in three main areas:

- To work with the Councils of the Church to help them identify and address the impacts of climate change. This includes both practical issues such as reducing the carbon footprint of the church's own estate; raising awareness of Ministers, Presbyteries and staff, and working with partners in countries overseas through the World Mission Council to highlight the global consequences of our emissions.
- To support Eco-Congregation Scotland and help the Programme respond effectively to climate change. The ecumenical Eco-Congregation Scotland Programme now includes over 270 congregations across Scotland, from many different denominations. Eco-Congregation Scotland now form one of the largest networks of voluntary environmental groups in Scotland. More information can be found at:

- To contribute to the wider debate in Scotland, for example through our work with the Stop Climate Chaos Scotland coalition, which includes approximately 60 Scottish organisations who work on climate change issues. The Church welcomes the Climate Change (Scotland) Bill and is participating in the national debate to ensure that the commitment to an 80% reduction in greenhouse gases is taken forward across Scotland. 

In 2009, The General Assembly instructed Presbyteries, in association with the Church and Society Council, to produce plans for congregations in the Presbytery to measure the energy consumption and the carbon footprint of their buildings and commit to a year on year reduction of 5% in their carbon footprint, to which many congregations and Presbyteries have since responded very positively.


