From the Minister

A LAND OF PURE DELIGHT?



The modern idea of the 'earworm' is about a tune that you hear played perhaps on the radio or on the street, or on your I-player, and you can't get it out of your head because it has 'wormed its way' in. In these uncertain days, as I wonder about what the future may hold, my earworm is the tune (with the words) of the old hymn whose first line is my title.

> There is a land of pure delight, where saints immortal reign; infinite day excludes the night, and pleasures banish pain.

This once-loved hymn is about the prospect of ending life, looking forward hopefully to a happy heaven, a place where all the weary are at rest in a blessed eternity. Some of the hymn's lines may have contemporary chords to strike:-

There everlasting spring abides, and never-withering flowers;

Sweet fields beyond the swelling flood stand dressed in living green;

But there are doubts and fears about our crossing to this place of security.

Might it be too good to be true?

Scepticism is like the earworm, becoming an almost automatic response in a time when we are aware of scams, fake news and warnings and threats.

Our attention is forcibly drawn to the looming problems posed by global warming and urgent issues of environmental management.

The hymn is of course an encouragement to faith and our faith is challenged today in many ways: / continued

in world and in domestic politics, in the future of the planet and the safety and stability of our children's heritage. Few folk in today's world must think they are anywhere near a land of pure delight, and the values on which we base our faith and that we struggle to affirm and hold on to cannot be those of 'pie in the sky'. So we should do our best to express our Christian principles in everyday life and to find ways of showing that we do not give in to cynicism and pessimism but hold to the hope that we find in following Jesus and rising above the world's betrayals and disillusion. In the offerings and gifts we bring in this month of October we will celebrate the benefits of the season by contributing as we are able to inspire hope and encouragement in places near and far, where there are so many different needs. We recognise the needs of now for those who are short of food, or shelter, medical or material supplies.

Practical Christianity means following the Gospel and putting into active expression the gratitude we feel for the gifts of life and the benefits of Creation that we have the good fortune to share in our land and communities. So in our thanksgiving we must try to show our neighbours and all members of our global family that there is hope and there can be a better world than the one they have so far experienced.

In God's name we must offer prospects, not of 'pure delight' or 'everlasting Spring', but of safety, support, comfort, co-operation.

Our duty of thanksgiving is: 'to bring Good News to the poor, to heal the broken-hearted, to bring release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to free the downtrodden from oppressors, to show that the time of the Lord's favour has come.'. Luke Chapter 4: verses 18, 19

We must try to bring the Kingdom in – in every way we can.

Thanks to a great deal of hard work involving both planning and the physical removal of everything that was either in or under the Sanctuary, the actual work on the church has begun. The contractors, John Dennis and Company started



on site on 26 August. Currently the plan is that they will finish the Phase 1 works by 24 April 2020, but there will be work for us to do after they vacate, so it is likely we will resume worship in the Church sometime in May. A lot has happened up to this point but it is especially good to feel that we are 'properly' under way.

The preparatory work included trying to ensure that we kept everything we will need over the next eight or nine months and arranged for everything else either to be stored off-site or disposed of. Then, of course, we had to make arrangements for the Large Hall to be used for Sunday worship while at the same time trying to ensure that those who use the Halls during the week are as little inconvenienced as possible. Inevitably, there have been some necessary compromises but things seem to be working well and the cooperation of everyone involved has been greatly appreciated.

One of the major jobs before the contractors could begin work was the removal of the pews. Again this meant a great deal of work but it is good to know that all the pews have either been bought by individual members of the congregation, by architectural salvage firms, craftsmen or others who will recycle the wood so that nothing will go to waste.

If you had a chance to look into the Sanctuary after the pews were removed you will have seen what a wonderful space we now have and will have realised how much potential it has. The removal of the pews, as well as freeing up the space for much more flexible use, has made the Sanctuary much brighter –



and that is before we put in new lighting and flooring! /continued

Now, of course, the Sanctuary is strictly out of bounds to everyone except the project managers and even they can only gain access by prior arrangement. This is obviously for safety reasons and when you realise that the first major job for the contractors was the removal of the floor you can see how necessary this is!

Happily, there is a link on the church website to a virtual reality tour. This allows us, in effect, to look in and see how the work is progressing. If you go to <u>http://www.blackhallstcolumba.org.uk/refurbishment/</u> you will find links to 'Virtual Reality Tour of Works' and 'Timelapse Video of Works'. These will show you how things look now and they will be updated from time to time.

Over the summer all the halls and corridors have been redecorated and this has given them a much smarter appearance. In addition, the toilets at the rear of the Large Hall have been totally renewed. New notice boards have been put up along the east wall of the Large Hall and in the main corridor. Much of the noticeboard space has already been allocated to some of the groups who use the halls but, as well as these, there is a dedicated area in the Large Hall for updates about Building for the Future and one of the new boards in the corridor will also be set aside for this purpose.

Finally, this is very much a project which involves and affects the whole congregation and thanks are due to everyone who has contributed either financially or in practical ways or in many cases both.







Harvest Appeal

Kasthuri's story

'I couldn't do this alone - but together we can be successful.'



Harvest time is coming. Five women chat and laugh as they tend rows of organic tomato plants, which are already loving the hot sunshine.

Kasthuri's life wasn't always like this. Like her friends, she was born into India's underclass; as a Dalit, she knows what it feels like to be discriminated against and alone.

She survived because someone had faith in her. Selvi is from a different caste, but she gave Kasthuri what she needed most – a home to raise her son, Mathi. 'Normally, someone from her community wouldn't even hand a

cup of water to a Dalit person' says Kasthuri. Fortunately, Selvi is determined to change the world around her.

The EcoVeg project is also breaking barriers. It supports Kasthuri and her women's farming collective with agricultural and business skills, and gets them a fair price for their crop. For the first time, everyone has a sense of control over their lives. 'Alone as a woman, I couldn't do this' says Kasthuri, 'but together, we can be successful. I have no words to explain how happy I am to be here with my son.'

This year the WA⁺CH Committee is supporting Beach Wheelchairs Portobello (Scottish Charity SC046190) and Kindred (Scottish Charity SC000264).

Beach Wheelchairs Portobello provide the free hire of beach wheelchairs from a base adjacent to the promenade at Portobello beside the Tumbles car park. They have wheelchairs suitable for children and adults and a hoist is available if required. We hope to donate enough funds to provide a new chair for children.

Kindred have a team based at Edinburgh's Royal Hospital for Sick Children which provides practical information, emotional support and guidance, supporting families of children with complex needs. They also have a trained therapist who provides massage therapy in the ward.

We recognise that with the Building for the Future project already started and the sanctuary unavailable for the rest of the year, there could be challenges ahead to our fundraising programme. Nevertheless, we plan to hold the usual events and continue the run of 28 consecutive Christmas Fairs at Blackhall St Columba's.

Our fundraising started with the Summer Pennies Collection, raising the figure of £905.89 during the services in July and August and the committee would like to thank most sincerely all those who helped to raise this sum by bringing coins and donations.

Our next event is the Craft Coffee Morning which will be held in the Large Hall on Saturday 19 October between 10.00 am and 12.00 noon. This is always a bright and cheerful occasion and we hope you will come to sample home baking and view (and buy) the produce of those talented people who do home crafts. Donations of baking and produce would be most welcome.

KIRK SESSION REPORT

The Kirk Session met on 21 July, 11 August and 23 September.

The meeting held on 21 July was primarily for the Kirk Session to agree the terms of the contract to carry out the work under phase 1 of the Building for the Future project. The Kirk Session agreed that John Dennis & Company (Scotland) Limited be appointed as the contractor. Fay Stirling, Project Manager, was thanked for all her work in getting us to this stage.

The meeting held on 11 August was convened in order that the Kirk Session, as required under Church law, could vote for a second time relative to the Ministers and Deacons in Civil Partnerships Act. Following debate the voting was as follows:-

Depart from current doctrine	32
Remain with the current doctrine	14

The decision on this second and final vote was to depart from The Church of Scotland view on this matter.

Banner

It was agreed that a banner be procured to display the time of Sunday Worship. The banner will be situated on the wall of the Large Hall facing Queensferry Road.

Elder resignation / retiral

Andrew Walls intimated his resignation as an active Elder. Tribute was made to Andrew's service as Communion Convener and Chair of the Pirie Mission Partnership Group amongst the other work he did for the Church.

In August Margaret McArthur retired as an active Elder after thirty three years service to the Congregation. Over that long period Margaret made a significant contribution to the life and well being of Blackhall St Columba's with her editorial skills, the dedication that she gave to the Pirie Partnership along with the attention that she extended to the members in her District.

Harvest Thanksgiving

The Harvest Thanksgiving Service will be held on Sunday 13 October. Donations will be apportioned between Fresh Start and NE Edinburgh Foodbank and Sandy Aitken and Fiona Cooke have graciously agreed to attend to the transportation to these locations.

- The Parish Profile is being worked on and when that is ready and agreed we can formally advertise the role. Meantime our vacancy features prominently in The Church of Scotland 'List of Charges being Advertised' which will alert any minister who might be interested.

Remember The Football Pools?

When I was a boy, long before the National Lottery, a "wee flutter" on the Football Pools was taken by many households throughout the land. I could never understand the way "lines" were formatted by my Dad but I did know it was all about forecasting, for a small monetary stake, draws in upcoming football matches. This when they were all played on Saturday by the way as Sunday then was a day only of rest and for the Kirk. I'd get a chance to pick a draw or two as did my Mum but our selections were often to my father's great incredulity and perhaps he didn't put down crosses at what we chose. Maybe that's also why we never won anything.

We at Blackhall St Columba's have certainly won now though and without risking a penny!

We have put in our claim for tax back on Gift Aided donations made for the year to 5 April 2019. Congregational general giving was £124,075 with £8,000, the maximum permissible, for undocumented small cash donations producing a return of £33,046. Also included were Building for the Future donations of £213,880 producing £53,470 making £86,516 extra for the Church in total!!

Now the Football Pools top prize was limited in my time to £75,000 so haven't we done well?!

Of course the very generous giving for the Building this year might not be repeated in subsequent years but it does show what an enormous impact Gift Aid has on both our ability to pay every day bills as well as for capital fundraising but all for the work and mission of the church.

Put it this way, for any future building or development phases if we encourage 200 donors to give £25 monthly, Gift Aided (extra 25%), for 4 years we'd have raised £300,000 by the end of the term. You can work out various encouraging scenarios. For instance - 400 donors of £30 monthly over 4 years raises £960,000. Let's call it a million.

This all discounts possible legacies so maybe we *can* get what and where we'd all like to be in future.


A warm welcome is extended to all existing members and any visitors or newcomers. Membership for the year remains at £15 or £2 an evening for visitors.

Moderator calls for prayer as radical action continues

Published on 16 September, 2019

As the Church of Scotland continues its work on the agreed Radical Action Plan voted for by this year's General Assembly, including the recent appointment of the new Chief Officer, Rt Rev Colin Sinclair, calls on Kirk members to join in prayer using an upcoming series of weekly prayers written by people from across the Church and its partners.



The Moderator called on congregations in every community to "come together" in prayer and reflection, noting that the 2019 General Assembly asked for prayer after accepting a set of radical proposals which will reshape the Church of Scotland at every level over the coming years.

Commissioners made their decisions recognising that that the Church cannot stand still when the world around us has changed dramatically and fewer people in our country share our faith.

In order to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ more effectively, all of us must embrace radical change.

To help us on our way we will need courage, collaboration, generosity and prayer.

To support the work underway in local churches, presbyteries and in the central offices, a series of prayers will be posted on our website and shared across the Church of Scotland from mid-September to December.

Rt Rev Colin Sinclair, the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, said:

"These prayers can be used personally, in Church gatherings of varied sizes or built into Sunday worship.

"This helpful resource can act as a catalyst to encourage us not just to talk about praying but actually to pray.

"Can I encourage you to look out for these prayers, to use them and the other prayer resources that are already available on the website?"

Retreat, rest and reflection to allow space for God to change us

The 2001 report, entitled A Church Without Walls, stated that: 'It is difficult to change direction. The old routines, requirements and habits are instinctive. We often need to stop, stand back and reflect before we can reset our priorities.' / continued

Moderator calls for prayer as radical action continues (continued)

The report went on to recommend that the leadership in every area of Church life institute the discipline of a period of retreat, rest and reflection to allow space for God to change us.

This year's agreed Radical Action Plan mirrored that emphasis on prayer saying: "We are a people of faith, rooted in prayer. We are not called to be busier: we are called to be faithful in our efforts to follow Jesus."

Prayers from people across the Church of Scotland and our partners will be posted each week, between 23 September until late November through news stories and on the Prayer section of our website.

Below is the first prayer of the series from Rt Rev Colin Sinclair, the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

This is the time to pray.

Jesus Christ You call us all to follow You in the adventure of faith. As we begin the process of change guided by Your spirit, help us to trust You.

Help us to willingly let go of all "the ways we have always done things", when it feels safer to shrink from changes that deeply affect us, back into what we have known. Inspire us to take risks, to creatively and courageously be Your church today: looking to You in worship, reaching into our communities venturing out in service.

Bless the Church of Scotland as we seek to build Your Kingdom. Bless the Assembly Trustees in their tasks, bless the new Chief Officer when they take up their post and help us all to see what we can do, together, to bring into being the Radical Action Plan.

Let us renew our commitment to follow You as we step out in glad obedience. For Your name's sake. Amen

Its that time of year again when I ask if you would like to have a yearly subscription for Life & Work, the Church of Scotland magazine.


