

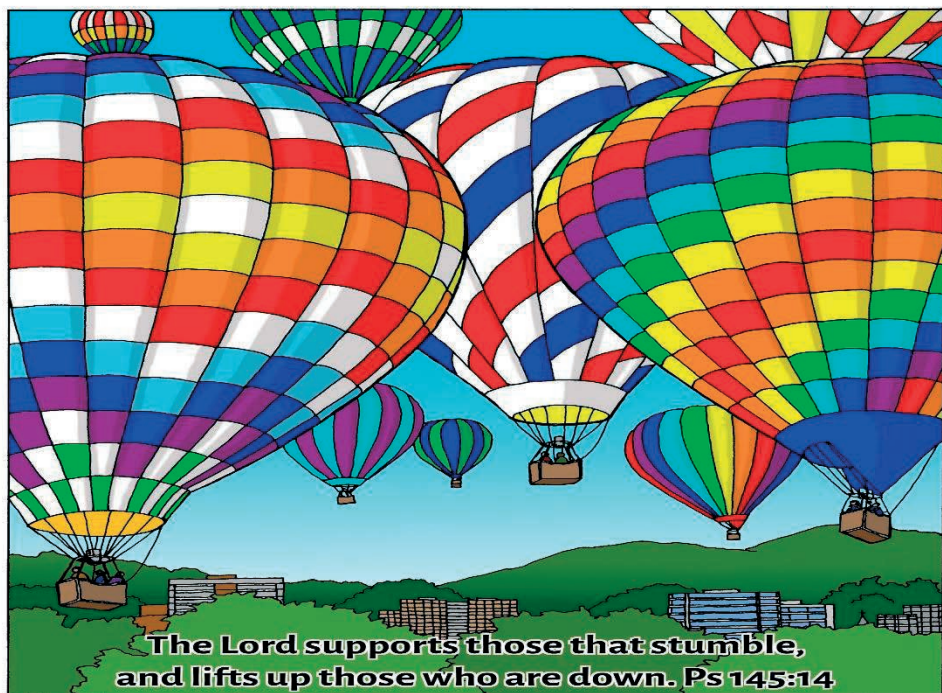

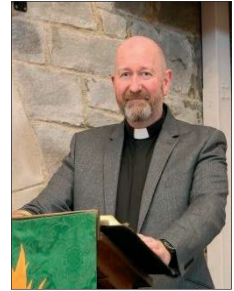
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Awesomely Approachable The psalmist writes in Psalm 47:2, “For the Lord Most High is awesome, the great King over all the earth.”

What is it to be ‘awesome’, though? The word ‘awesome’ is used frequently nowadays. It is particularly evident in American culture, where everything from films to a pizza might be described as ‘awesome’.



The meaning of words has evolved over time. The Russian ruler Ivan the Terrible got his famous name because he was, in fact, ‘awesome’. In older times the word *terrible* meant something like awe-inspiring, or even terrifying. He was, in effect, Ivan the Awesome, meaning that he was a really powerful person whom you might respect, obey out of fear and generally leave alone and try to avoid. It is wholly appropriate that, as the word *terrible* evolved, it stuck with Ivan, as he was, by all accounts, a thoroughly nasty character.

In modern English translations of the Bible, the word *awesome* is used to describe God many times. This is a change from some older translations, such as the King James Version, which used words like *terrible*, *dreadful* or *fearful*. These are all attempts to translate Hebrew words that convey the idea of profound reverence, wonder and holy fear.

I think the word *awesome*, as we understand it today, is a far better description of the God that Jesus reveals to us in his ministry. The testimony of the Bible presents us with a truly awesome God: the Creator and Sustainer of all life, all-knowing and all-powerful and yet, at the same time, loving, merciful and forgiving. As important as all that is, through Jesus we are also introduced to a God who is approachable.

Even though God is approachable, I think he still deserves and commands our respect. One of the most amazing things about God, and something that sets him apart from every earthly ruler, is that he does not force our obedience.

He has given his creation—us—free will. God gives us the ability to choose him, or not.

Past generations of Christians understood and expressed this as ‘the fear of the Lord’. [Proverbs 1:7](#) tells us, “[The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge; fools despise wisdom and instruction.](#)”

Unfortunately, the word *fear* has also changed in meaning over the years. Today, when we speak of fear, we usually mean being frightened or anxious. We fear illness, war, financial uncertainty or the things that keep us awake at night. That is not the primary meaning of the biblical phrase *the fear of the Lord*.

To fear the Lord is not to be terrified that God is waiting to punish us for every mistake we make. If that were true, Jesus would never have encouraged people to call God “Father”. Throughout the Gospels we see Jesus welcoming sinners, eating with those whom society rejected, touching those considered unclean and offering forgiveness to people who thought they were beyond hope. Again and again, he showed us that God's heart is full of compassion.

At the same time, Jesus never reduced God to being merely a friendly companion. He taught us to pray, “[Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name.](#)” God is our loving Father, but he is also holy. He is close to us, yet he is utterly different from us. He knows everything about us, loves us completely and still calls us to lives of holiness and faithfulness.

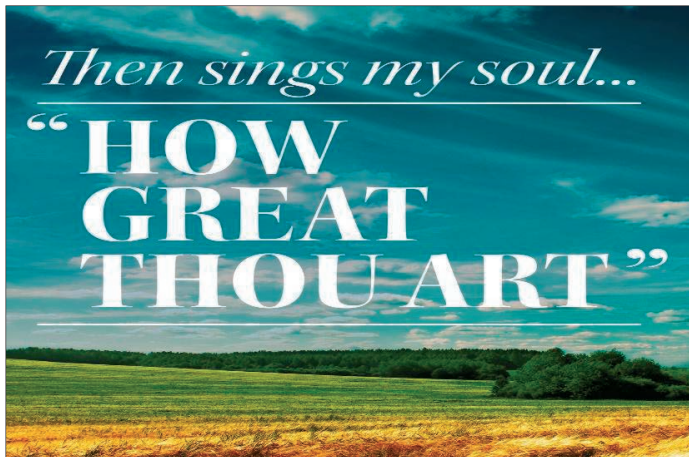
Perhaps a better way to understand the fear of the Lord is to think of standing on the edge of the Grand Canyon, gazing into a clear night sky filled with countless stars, or watching the sea in the middle of a storm. Such experiences remind us how small we are and how great the world is. They fill us with awe and wonder. We are not necessarily afraid, but we recognise that we are in the presence of something far greater than ourselves.

The God who created all of that is infinitely greater still. Yet the wonder of the Christian faith is that this awesome God wants to know us personally. He does not remain distant. In Jesus Christ he entered our world, shared our humanity, carried our sins to the cross and rose again so that we might share in his life.

That changes everything. We do not obey God because we are cowering in fear. We follow Christ because we have encountered the overwhelming love of the One who first loved us. Our reverence grows out of gratitude. Our worship flows from wonder. Our obedience is the response of children who know they are deeply loved by their heavenly Father.

So, when the Bible speaks about the fear of the Lord, it is inviting us into a relationship marked by both reverence and love. It reminds us never to take God lightly, while at the same time encouraging us never to doubt his welcome. The God who is awesome in power is also abundant in grace. He invites each one of us to come to him through Jesus Christ, not shrinking back in terror, but drawing near with confidence, trusting that the One who made the universe also knows us by name and delights to call us his own.

Kirk Session Report

The Kirk Session: The Kirk Session met on Tuesday 21 April, Tuesday 26 May and Tuesday 23 June 2026.

At the start of the meetings tributes were made by the Session Clerk to Elders who had passed away. Over the three months tributes were delivered for John Crombie, Jean Wishart and Dugald MacNeill.

Church Officers

It was decided that going forward the Church Officer role would be retitled Facilities Officer.

Congregational Roll: It was agreed to admit the following members by resolution of the Kirk Session: Alastair Ramsay and Mrs Katherine Ramsay.

Communication Committee: Hamish Mair intimated his wish to retire as Convener of the Communication Committee and was thanked for his commitment to the role. Session agreed to James Burr taking over from Hamish.

Correspondence: A note of thanks has been received from the following:

St Columba's Hospice for the proceeds from the Easter Services retiring collection, namely £729.

Fabric: It has been necessary to carry out essential repairs to the church roof. Three estimates were obtained and Session agreed that Bain & Irvine be instructed to carry out the work at a cost of £18,669 + VAT.

Finance: At the April meeting Adrian Johnston, Congregational Treasurer, presented a report on the Congregation's finances for the first three months of the year.

In summary: -

- Offerings were £900 lower than for the same period in 2025.
- Taking into account legacies (£7,500) there was a surplus of £8,139 year to date.
- Total funds stood at £374,000 as of 31 March.

Hall Convener: Ruth Laidlaw intimated her wish to retire as Hall Convener. It was agreed that Sheila Mackintosh would take over the role. Ruth was thanked for her work and the commitment given to the role.

Just One Thing: Michael Cockburn provided an update on the 'Just One Thing' initiative adding that since January to end May 1,616 items had been received from the Congregation and delivered to Ferryhill Primary School's 'Sharing Shelf' project. Session agreed that over the Summer holidays when the School is closed the donations will go to the Drylaw Neighbourhood Centre for their 'Larder Shelf'.

Presbytery Elder: Eddie Thorn was reappointed Presbytery Elder.

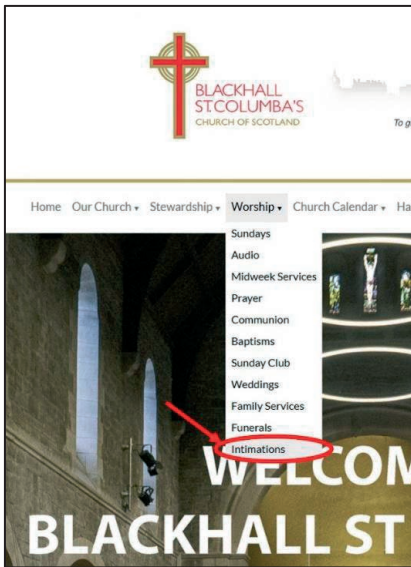
Presbytery Plan: Discussions with both the Presbytery Deployment Committee and Drylaw Church have been ongoing. Subsequent to the Kirk Session meeting on 23 June there was a further meeting when it was provisionally agreed that members of the Presbytery Deployment Committee would meet with both Kirk Sessions on Saturday 31 October 2026.

Soup 'n' Chat: Michael Cockburn reported that 'Soup 'n' Chat had now been running for three years and although numbers had declined what was offered was still much appreciated and enjoyed by those who attended. It was noted that extra drivers were much needed.

Tower Repairs

Scaffolding at Church Entrance

Many of you will have noticed the scaffolding erected beside the Church entrance. This gave a roofing company safe access up to the Tower and, in general, other aspects of the Church and Hall Roofs. While any missing slates or small leaks have been repaired when they were found, a general survey of the overall condition had not been done for a while. This especially applied to concerns with the Flat Roof on the Tower and other key areas.

Initially a 'Drone' survey presented pictures of the areas followed by a manual check. This led to a report on the conditions found and Kirk Session agreeing to fund the necessary repairs by the selected company.

The Tower itself was also increasingly becoming a 'Doocot' so the opportunity was also taken to engage a company that would clear up the mess, move the pigeons out and close up where they were getting in. Time will tell how effective these steps are in dissuading determined and clever birds.

In addition, this month, both blue notice boards in the grounds have been removed for refurbishment.

A busy spell of works but very worthwhile.

Church Pilgrimage to Rosslyn Chapel

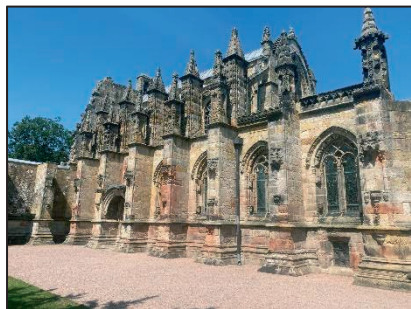


The Pilgrims

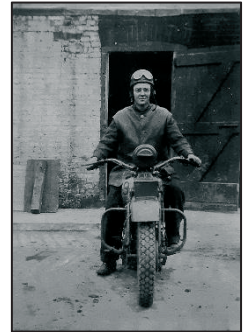

Monte Cassino Remembrance

On Friday 22nd May 2024, local residents Tom and Gillian Atkinson visited Blackhall St Columba's with their Canadian visitors, Rev Dr Sharon Wilson (cousin of Gillian) and her husband Rick Woodhouse. Sharon is a recently retired minister of the United Church of Canada and her ancestors lived in Auchterarder, Scotland. They were interested to hear about our Monte Cassino cross and our connection with the Monte Cassino Society because Sharon's father, Russell Wilson, fought in the battle of Monte Cassino.

Russell Wilson was a dispatch rider with the Canadian Royal Canadian Corps of Signals. At the battle of Monte Cassino, he had to take cover in a ditch. The Germans had destroyed the village across the Liri River and were using the rubble to provide cover for their snipers guarding against Allied access to the various temporary bridges. He had to stay there for three days, because every time he raised his head it attracted enemy fire. Fortunately, Russell survived and went on to serve in Belgium, Holland and Germany.

After the war, Russell returned to Hamilton, Ontario where he married Lillian Faichney and began a 40-year career in the steel industry working for DOFASCO as a manufacturing engineer. Like most Italian Campaign Veterans, he shared little about that time in his life. In his eighties he was diagnosed with PTSD related to his WWII service.

"What is the Bible", by Rob Bell. Harper Collins Publishers, 2017

"Simple yet profound, entertaining and humorous, Bell's brilliant book demonstrates how over time the Bible writers progressively grasped and revealed the nature of God. He exposes the real meaning, context and connection behind difficult tales, such as the Akedah, Noah's Ark, or Jonah and the Whale. He does not circumvent the violence of the Old Testament. Jesus' Life is placed into his contemporary Jewish context so that it illuminates His speech and actions.

There is no impenetrable theology. The book is accessible to all, and Bell's insights are so fascinating it is difficult to put it down. Be prepared to have your mind blown open. So many of our questionings about fact or fiction or relevance will be illuminated. The best book on reading the Bible I have read."

Although we are neighbours, our choir and that of Davidsons Mains have never, in my time, worked together on a common service. So, it was with some excitement and anticipation that Phil Coad, organist at D' Mains, and I started a conversation before Christmas 2025 about doing some sort of joint service.

Both churches have commitments over the Easter period so it was agreed we should have a joint choral service at 6pm on Pentecost Sunday evening on the 24th of May. Both choirs worked hard independently preparing the songs and then we held a couple of practices where we came together for the first time in the weeks before the event.

On the evening Phil and I shared the joyful task of accompanying the pieces sung by the 29-strong joint choir. We were thrilled to see 72 in the audience which was sensitively led by ministers Fergus Cook and Dan Robertson using the Scriptures to explain what Pentecost is about. The choir sang a mix of pieces ranging from classical John Rutter "I Will Sing With the Spirit" to the stirring Brooklyn Tabernacle "Total Praise". The congregation joined in heartily with several hymns and the time together was rounded off with tasty refreshments and fellowship between the two churches.

We hope to repeat this success at some other time and we will be in touch once the plans are made.

ages from all over Edinburgh and they really produce a remarkably competent performance. I heard them for the first time last year and immediately decided to book them for our series. This is the first date they could give me. If you love good music from a wide variety of styles from classics to American Songbook then put the date in your diary. As usual there is no charge but donations will go to help the band as they give a lot of their time to charitable causes.

They have basic rules for joining in and you might be interested to know their guidelines! However, do not be fooled into thinking this is sounds like an amateur band it is not!

Golden Rules for Ensemble Playing

1. Everyone should play the same piece.
2. Stop at every repeat sign and discuss in detail whether to take the repeat or not. Listeners will love this a lot!
3. Carefully tune your instrument before playing. That way you can play out of tune with a clear conscience.
4. Take your time turning pages.
5. The right note at the wrong time is a wrong note and vice-versa.
6. If everyone gets lost except you, follow those who get lost.
7. If a passage is difficult, slow it down. If it's easy, speed it up. Everything will work itself out in the end.
8. If you are completely lost, stop everyone and say, "I think we should tune".
9. Happy are those who have not perfect pitch, for the kingdom of music is theirs.
10. If the ensemble must stop because of you, explain in detail why you got lost. Everyone will be very interested.
11. A wrong note played timidly is a wrong note. A wrong note played with authority is an interpretation.
12. When everyone else has finished playing, you should not play any notes you have left.

News from Connect – Sundays at 6pm

Our Worship Team is responsible for sketching out, under guidance from Fergus Cook, the shape of the services throughout the year. You will see a list we have just agreed below. There is a "Connect Group" which meets on Sundays at 6pm for just over an hour and we take time to consider a range of interesting topics and share our insights. Last year we used the Bible Society's "Bible Course" which was an 8 week walk through the whole Bible. – yes, the whole thing. It was presented on video by Dr Andrew Ollerton and he showed us a visual way of seeing the layout from Genesis to Revelation. Each week we considered another part of the Bible and then he showed how it all is pulled together with Jesus Christ as its object. At the end of the series on March 26th, we discussed - what next! Dr Ollerton also has a series taking viewers through the book of Romans. Despite this being one of the most difficult books in the Bible to understand, it is also the most important one for Christians to understand as it shows us the basis of our faith and the grace of God as demonstrated in the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ. After a short break following Easter, we began this series, with around 30 members from our church and a few from Drylaw Parish Church meeting on Sundays. Together, we have discussed deep theological topics and grown in confidence in the foundations of our faith, seeing that there is no conflict between scientific and historical evidence and that faith grounded in historical fact is not a leap in the dark, but a logical step in understanding.

We paused for the summer on 21 June and will meet again in the autumn. Everyone is welcome to join us. If you would like to watch the series before deciding, search for ["The Romans Course Session 1" on YouTube.](#) If you are not sure how to do that come

along when we announce the date and you will enjoy sharing a new experience with friends over a cup of tea or coffee.

Data Protection

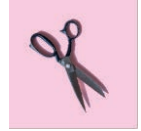
This is my annual rant about protecting our data.

Enough people are being scammed that we should not add to the potential by giving away details through careless habits.

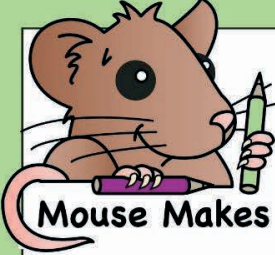
