

Like many of you I spent a lot of July watching the Olympic Games in Paris. I heard many references to Eric Liddell who ran the 400m instead of the 100m for which he was favourite. Most people, thanks to the 1981 film *Chariots of Fire*, know he changed distances because the heats were to be held on a Sunday and, as a devout Christian, Eric would not run on a Sunday, the Lord's Day. Instead, he was preaching in the Scots church in Paris. He not only won the gold medal, but he also set a World Record of 47.6 seconds which stood for a long time.

But why is he still remembered today and why is there an Eric Liddell Community in

Edinburgh? Although he was born to missionary parents in China, at age 5 he and his brother were sent back to Scotland for their education as was the norm then. He went on to gain a BSc in Pure Science from Edinburgh University and as well as being an excellent runner he also represented Scotland in the national rugby team seven times. He returned to China following his parents into the mission field. In 1941 he sent his wife, pregnant with their third child, and with their two daughters, to Canada as he feared for their safety in China. He was interned at the Weihsien Internment Camp with other missionaries. Here he kept the spirits up with his good humour, taught, was in charge of fitness and sport training and helped the elderly. His positive attitude and kindness helped many. To encourage a fellow prisoner whose shoes were falling apart, he gave him his running shoes from Paris Olympics saying the man needed them more than he needed to keep them. He suffered increasingly severe headaches and died in 1945 of an inoperable brain tumour. At Eric's request, The Salvation Army musicians played *Be Still My Soul* outside his window as he passed away.

On a recent Songs of Praise (27<sup>th</sup> July) we heard of the work of the Eric Liddell Centre set up in 1980 to help the community by hosting a dementia day service, support for carers, befriending service and music therapy to name but a few. There are many events in the Hub on Morningside Road and an exhibition in the Scottish Parliament running Monday – Saturday until the 12<sup>th</sup> of September.

To celebrate the centenary of his famous win the Centre has launched *Eric Liddell 100* an initiative to help continue and expand their work. To find out more about it go on line to **ericliddell.org** and have an opportunity to make a donation to help continue and expand the work. A special service was held in St Giles' Cathedral to commemorate Eric and all that he stood for. The Princess Royal as Patron of the Eric Liddell 100 was there to speak of his work and carrying on his legacy. Edinburgh University decided to present Eric with a posthumous honorary degree to mark the centenary of his gold medal win in Paris and his eldest daughter, Patricia, came from Canada to accept it from Professor Grant Jarvie, Chair of Sport.


The secret of my success over the 400m is that I run the first 200m as fast as I can. Then, for the second 200m, with God's help, I run faster.

God made me fast. And when I run I feel his pleasure. Eric Liddell

"He who honours me I will honour 1 Samuel 2 v 30 Wishing you the best of success always".

This was the gist of the verse Eric was given when he ran his 400m. The latter part was added to make the welcome note all those attending the service in St Giles received when they entered the church.

# Are you climbing?

As I travel on my way to Edinburgh from Glasgow along the M8, I often notice the brown road sign advertising the EICA, the Edinburgh International Climbing Arena. Although I have never been to that particular one, I have been to other climbing arenas and have even enjoyed a bit of climbing and abseiling when I was younger.

Climbing is a popular activity and has been made very accessible by the advent of 'mobile' climbing walls such as the type that appears at the Blackhall Children's Sports Day, held at Ravelston Park. (This year we were especially blessed with the weather given the previous days' downpours.) For those who didn't see the wall or don't know about them, 'mobile climbing walls' are cylindrical contraptions that rise vertically up into the air from a base at ground level. Into the rock like surface are bolted a number



of hand and foot holds, sufficient to allow a climber to make it to the top but not so many as to make it easy. Suspended from arms at the top are climbing ropes which, once clipped on, stop people from falling and injuring themselves.

There is always a range of reactions from people if you ask the question 'are you climbing?' Most youngsters are very keen and even excited whilst others, of a more mature disposition, could be seen to be less keen!

What do you make of lots of different people all putting in a deal of effort to reach the same point, each facing a different arrangement of handholds and footholds? Each person climbs at a different speed, perhaps according to skill and past experience. Often, there is much encouragement and even advice offered by others who are climbing and even by those standing watching from below. Is it possible to think of faith a bit like that?

There is a daunting aspect to committing to a big endeavour, but examples of success and others encouragement can spur us on. Faithful discipleship demands effort and, perhaps, a sense of adventure for we enter unfamiliar and, at times, tricky terrain. We keep going not only because we can see we are progressing but also because we want to see the view from the top. Also, if we are unfortunate enough to slip, to lose our grip and fall, we also have the confidence of knowing that we are securely held.

Psalm 121 is listed as 'A Song of Ascents' and is cited as an 'Assurance of God's Protection'. In the Psalm (listed below), the psalmist asks, 'who will help?' He then reminds himself that God, who made us the heaven and the earth, watches over us and so, we will not slip on the scree nor be burned by the sun. It is only those who attempt the climb, the ascent, that can expect to experience this divine care. Remaining in the foothills, like standing at the bottom of the climbing wall, allows for little direct awareness of God's empowering us to climb higher or to experience His safe keeping if we falter.

In Blackhall St Columba's Church, faith informs much of our living as individuals and as a community within Blackhall. As we seek to welcome all to the Church to share in what we know, perhaps you too might hear the question; 'are you climbing?'

I lift up my eyes to the hills—from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth. He will not let your foot be moved; he who keeps you will not slumber. 

Despite some encouraging economic signs so far this year, demand for home starter packs (household items) and membership of The Pantry Shop has grown significantly. The cost-of-living crisis continues to dominate the work by FreshStart and although the school holidays are over pressure on low-income families remains.

FreshStart's Pantry had introduced a "family" weekly rate for the school holidays which enabled families (with children) to leave the pantry with 40% more shopping in their basket. They paid £6.50 rather than the usual £4.50 but it makes a huge difference to them. Without this help and the Community meals run by FreshStart, many families would have had no choice but to use a Foodbank or skip meals. Donations of tinned and long dated packet food items are always appreciated to help stock the Pantry Shop.

Demand for starter packs grows as people from the city and new to the area find accommodation in the northwest of Edinburgh to set up home. If you have any surplus plates, bowls, pans, bedding, towels or curtains then please bring them on a Friday to the church hall between 10 and 11.30am where our duty volunteer will happily accept them. The FreshStart website (www.freshstartweb.org.uk) provides an up-to-date list of items needed as will our duty volunteer.

Again, thank you for your generous support as we help those in need in our city.

### FIRST AID PROVISION WITHIN THE CHURCH BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

Should anyone in the church buildings or grounds become unwell, the location of the First Aid Boxes, Wheelchairs and Defibrillators are as follows:

One First Aid Box is kept in the cupboard at the back of the sanctuary. That cupboard has a key with an orange label which must not be removed from the lock. There is clear First Aid signage above this cupboard. This box also contains a first aid dressings **kit**, with plasters, bandages, etc.

The second First Aid Box can be found on the table as you enter the annex room to Dorothea's office. There is clear First Aid signage on the annex room door. A duvet and a pillow contained in a duvet bag clearly marked, are available for those who may fall or need attention outside the church building. It sits on top of the First Aid box, also clearly marked. The first aid dressings **kit** for this box, is kept in the kitchen cupboard by the window.

There is a check list of contents inside each First Aid box. The boxes are checked regularly but should anything be missing or need attention please contact Betty Watt.

We now have three wheelchairs. All have two footplates. One is kept at the back of the Sanctuary. The other two are kept in the ladies' cloakroom area, opposite the kitchen. One is a modern lightweight wheelchair, the other is much older, heavier wheelchair which should only be used in an emergency. Its tyres require inflating periodically, whereas the more modern wheelchairs have solid tyres that only require inspection.

A defibrillator is mounted on the wall in the corridor opposite the kitchen, with clear signage. It is checked monthly and available for use by anyone in an emergency, whenever the church and halls are open.

A second Public Access Defibrillator, has been installed inside a yellow cabinet on the outside wall of the large hall, behind and to the right of the War Memorial. It is clearly visible from the road. To access the defibrillator in an emergency dial 999 and the operator will give the code needed to open the cabinet. There is a light inside the cabinet that activates if needed during the hours of darkness. It is also checked every month.

Both these defibrillators are registered on The Circuit, which means the Scottish Ambulance Service know their exact location by post code, (as well as the guaranteed hours of access to the defibrillator outside the kitchen.) The manuals for both devices are kept on top of the First Aid Box in the annex room to Dorothea's Office.

An accident/incident book is positioned on the wall below the defibrillator, opposite the kitchen. Please ensure anything of note is recorded, dated and signed at the time of the incident.

# **SUNDAY CLUB**




