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'Where do we find Wisdom?'

"If any of you is lacking in wisdom, ask God, who gives to all generously and ungrudgingly, and it will be given you. But ask in faith, never doubting, for the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea, driven and tossed by the wind. For the doubter, being double-minded and unstable in every way, must not expect to receive anything from the Lord." (James 1:5-8)

In the Old Testament, wisdom was often portrayed as an individual with certain attributes and was always female. Wisdom was regarded as being God-given and God-centred discernment regarding the practical issues in life. More recently, the



Cambridge Dictionary has defined wisdom as 'the ability to use your knowledge and experience to make good decisions and judgements.'

Irrespective of your faith background, it is important to think about from where we take our wisdom.

A couple of articles in the news and on the internet have caused me to think about this recently. The first article ran with the headline '*Artist pulps 6,000 copies of The Da Vinci Code and turns them into 1984*'. The Da Vinci Code by Dan Brown, is one of the most popular books ever written, with over 200million copies sold. I have read it myself and thoroughly enjoyed it. I remember being asked by a minister friend, who was surprised when he heard that I enjoyed the book, 'Do you really believe all that nonsense about Jesus having a baby with Mary Magdalene?' I retorted, 'No, but I also enjoyed the Harry Potter books and I don't believe in wizards and muggles.' Clearly, we all are able to enjoy a book without taking everything in it as literal fact. At the peak of its popularity, 'The Da Vinci Code' seemed to be everywhere but, once people had finished reading it, there was an abundance of unwanted copies in charity and used-book shops. The artist, David Shrigley, saw this as an opportunity. He collected 6,000 unwanted copies of 'The Da Vinci Code' and mushed them down in order to create new versions of George Orwell's '1984'. Incidentally, that is another book I enjoyed without taking it literally. Clearly, David Shrigley believes that George Orwell's book is the more worthy and should be protected for future generations.

All of this led me to reflect on a further article from the internet which related to George Orwell's view of the world as expressed in '1984'. 'Amusing Ourselves to Death: Public Discourse in the Age of Show Business' is a book by Neil Postman. The book's origins lie in a talk Postman gave to the Frankfurt Book Fair in 1984. He was participating in a panel on George Orwell's 'Nineteen Eighty-Four' and the contemporary world. In the introduction to his book, Postman said that the contemporary world was better reflected by Aldous Huxley's book, 'Brave New World'. In the latter book, the public was oppressed by its addiction to amusement rather than by state violence as in Orwell's book. To sum up some of Postman's observations, he highlighted the fact that Orwell feared that books would be banned whilst Huxley feared that no one would want to read books. He demonstrated that Orwell feared the truth would be hidden from us whilst Huxley feared the truth would be drowned in a sea of irrelevance. He showed that, in 1984, people were controlled by pain whilst, in Brave New World people were controlled by pleasure and that Orwell feared that fear would ruin us whilst Huxley feared that desire would ruin us. Having thought long and hard about these things, I can't help but conclude that Huxley and Orwell were both correct. The world envisaged by Orwell is so similar to the situation in Russia that 1984 could have been written with it specifically in mind. The state controls everything through fear. Any deviation from the officially created news leads to arrest and imprisonment. Anyone standing up to the state is declared a dissident and, at best, arrested, at worst, murdered. On the other hand, the world envisaged by Huxley also exists here in the West. Whilst Huxley's world exists in many places, the United States of America is the most obvious example. All we need, to realise that truth has been lost in a sea of irrelevance, is to note the marked growth of expressions like 'fake news' and 'alternative facts' that are now in mainstream use.

Where then do we find wisdom? As you might expect with me being a minister, I would argue that we can find it, as quoted at the beginning of this article, from God. There are many sound pieces of advice and wisdom for our lives today contained in both the Old and New Testaments. One of the best pieces of wisdom I have found, and especially relevant to this article, comes from Paul's letter to the Romans; "Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:2)

In other words, we should try not to be moulded automatically by what everyone else thinks. We should think for ourselves as individuals, individuals who are known by and loved by God. Each of us must be wary about from where we get our information and from whom we accept advice. Personally, when I am considering an issue and trying to think wisely, I try to read at least three articles on the subject, one from either side of the argument and one from somewhere in the middle. It is not always perfect, but that approach does at least expose me to most of the arguments. Then I consider the old but still valuable mnemonic, WWJD? - What Would Jesus Do? Perhaps, in some instances, this can be amended to WWJS?, What Would Jesus Say? If I have a choice to make and can envisage Jesus saying or doing something, in a given situation, then I am confident it will be a wise choice. I will have found wisdom.



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



Getting to Know YouDorothy Leurs

Our third interview is with a lady who stays "in the dip" and who has had a lifetime of involvement with Scottish Country Dancing, culminating in an appearance on TV at the time of the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

Dorothy Leurs came to live in Blackhall half a century ago, when she spotted a "for sale" sign on a flat that would allow her to live close to her work as School Secretary at Mary Erskine's. She has seen many changes over the years but has always felt at home here and enjoys being involved in the midweek PEACE service and the CAMEO club at the church "up the road". She recently celebrated her 95th birthday, when this first photograph was taken.

First five years

Dorothy's family had a small-holding near Merchiston and her father turned it into a covered garage where people could keep their cars, at a time when few people had their vehicles at home. One of her early memories is of her dad's own Daimler, which he drove for weddings. She used to help brush it out afterwards and was allowed to keep any pennies she might find.

Working life

Before moving to Mary Erskine's for most of her career, Dorothy was the School Secretary at Broughton High School. Alongside her day job, however, Dorothy also spent many, many hours as a teacher of country dancing.

Scottish Country Dancing - the start of a lifetime passion...

Like so many, Dorothy first learned to dance with the Girl Guides in her church, when she was about 12, and every Saturday night there was a social dance in the church hall. She also cycled out to dance at the Edinburgh Youth Hostel at Juniper Green; but her favourite dances were at the Cavendish Ballroom at Tollcross, where she got in free because the bandleader and owner kept his Bentley in her dad's garage.

... and several Royal encounters



Since joining the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society in 1952, Dorothy has participated in various Royal events as a member of the Demonstration Team. In 1953, she was selected to dance with the Edinburgh branch at Murrayfield, at a Display and Pageant to celebrate the Coronation State Visit of Her Majesty the Queen. She went on to dance at Holyrood Palace on several occasions, not just for our own royal family but also for visiting heads of state, including King Hussein of Jordan and the King of Sweden. The photograph below shows Dorothy being presented to the late Queen.

70 years on, Dorothy was honoured to take part in a BBC interview with Dame Darcey Bussell, in a series of programmes to mark the Platinum Jubilee. She thoroughly enjoyed chatting to the well-known dancer and looked on with interest as the one-time Principal Ballerina put on her dancing shoes and joined in a reel with the Edinburgh country dancers.

Holiday Highlights

Dorothy's most memorable holidays have, unsurprisingly, been with other dancers. Throughout her years as a teacher, she led parties of dancers and musicians on holiday courses around the world. From Canada to New Zealand, and in many European countries, she enjoyed taking classes during the day and organising dances in the evening. The travellers would be joined by local dancers, too, keen to hear a live band from Scotland.

She particularly recalls dancing in a large balcony in Lagos, where the late Robbie Shepherd had come to join them to broadcast his Saturday night programme, "Take the Floor".

Food, Glorious Food

Always keen to try new food wherever she travelled, Dorothy's favourite meal was in a Phillipino restaurant in Auckland. A tasty vegetarian dish, followed by a delicious pudding made from fresh pineapple, are both still remembered with relish.

From Performer to Performance

While she has enjoyed various musical and theatrical performances, Dorothy's absolute favourite is "The Phantom of the Opera". She first experienced it in the Edinburgh Playhouse but has since seen it in various cities. In Melbourne, Australia, she got last-minute tickets to see it again – and found herself sitting behind Hayley and John Mills!

Unforgettable Experience

In contrast with all of the amazing opportunities offered by her dancing, Dorothy's happiest times were actually here in Edinburgh. For over 40 years, she was privileged to be invited to put together the programmes for the Summer Dancing in Princes Street Gardens. Her fondest memory is of a sunlit evening, in the stunning setting below Edinburgh Castle, as one of around 300 dancers, inspired by one of the best Scottish dance bands, with an audience from around the world.

Most valuable lesson you have learned from life, to share with our readers?

Yes - I learned it first from dancing, but it's proved to be absolutely true in every aspect of life - Fail to Prepare; Prepare to Fail!

And finally, your wish for the community here in Blackhall?

(Without a moment's hesitation) Bring back the Post Office! We are missing out on so much here.



Update: Ravelston Park Pavilion

2023 was yet another year of delays to the Community Asset Transfer (CAT) of Ravelston Park Pavilion from the City of Edinburgh Council to Blackhall Community Trust. However, progress (slow!) has been made and the transfer should conclude this spring. At last! Just before Christmas, the Trust lodged an application for Planning Permission in Principle for the proposed new Ravelston Park Pavilion. The new Pavilion will provide a purpose-built home for Blackhall Nursery and a multi-purpose community space. Every child that visited the visitors centre during the time leading up to Christmas received a gift, whether their parents or guardians requested them or not. This year three hundred and twentyeight children from one hundred and twenty six families had a Christmas presents to open on Christmas morning due to your kindness and generosity. Many adults also received presents from the gift collection but again we did not take note of the adults, as our focus was on the children. Every child where possible received a toy, an activity gift and book, and of course something nice. More than a thousand gifts were given out.

It is impossible to measure the difference that your kindness and generosity makes to these children. I cannot thank you enough for what you do. I feel proud and privileged to be part of such a special group of people.






