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# YOU HAVE TO WORK FOR IT!

There was once a farmer who used to say to his children when they were young, 'When you all reach the age of 12, I will tell you the secret of life'.

One day, when the eldest boy turned 12, he anxiously asked his father what the secret of life was. The father replied that he was going to tell him but that he should not reveal it to his brothers. "The secret of life is this. The cow does not give milk."

"What are you saying?" asked the boy incredulously.

The farmer replied, "As you hear it, son. The cow does not give milk, you have to milk it. You have to get up at 4 in the morning, go to the field, walk through the field, full of muck and manure,

tie the tail, hobble the legs of the cow, sit on the stool, place the bucket and do the work yourself. That is the secret of life, the cow does not give milk. You milk her or you don't get milk!"

We live in a time when certain generations think that cows GIVE milk and that many things are automatic and free. Some people's mentality seems to be that 'I wish, I ask..... I obtain.' Many people are accustomed to getting whatever they want the easy way. Many of the luxuries we enjoy today were not readily available to previous generations. For the vast majority of people, their grandparents would not have grown up knowing the simple pleasure of a hot shower and now they are taken for granted. Similarly, I remember as a youngster having coal delivered to the house and having to make up a fire which only seemed to heat the area around the fire and not the whole room. Central heating is a great development but it is also a luxury.

Despite the relative comfort and ease of most peoples' lives, comparatively speaking, we have never seen so many people struggle with their mental health or find themselves lacking in direction for their lives. We, as a society, have become used to getting everything quickly and easily. We can go on the internet and order just about anything and have it delivered to our doorstep the next day. Whilst this is very convenient, it doesn't always bring the same satisfaction that used to be had from putting some effort into finding something. Life should not be just a matter of wishing, asking and obtaining. The things that one receives should be the deserved consequence of the effort one makes. True happiness is often the result of effort and a lack of effort can create frustration. I know that some of the best presents I have received from my children were things that they made or put some real effort or thought into getting. The best cards I have ever received have been home made ones from children who have put real love and effort into their creation.

Whilst I have been speaking of material things, I believe the same is true of our spiritual life. Many people seem to want an easy fix for all their problems even those of a spiritual nature. In the gospel according to Matthew, Jesus said; "Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened." (Matthew 7:7-8)

Despite how easy this might sound at first, the asking must be done continuously, the seeking is an ongoing process and the knocking is a repetitive action. For most people, finding faith is the work of years. Even those who have found faith need continually to nurture it, continually to explore and think about it. When we think about quick, easy faith, we should remember some of the Old Testament stories such as the birth of Isaac. Sarah, Abraham's wife, had been barren for many years and scholars suggest that she was 90 and Abraham was 100 at the time of Isaac's birth. Of course, the whole concept of time, as it is understood in the modern age, may have had little or no relevance to the authors of the Bible and the societies from where they came. However, we can be sure that Sarah and Abraham held faith with God for a prolonged period before the eventual birth of their son.

As we approach Christmas, why not share with your children, from a young age, the secret of life so that they don't grow up with the mentality that the government, their parents or their cute little faces are going to give them everything they need in life. Whether it is food, a physical gift or more importantly faith, if it is worthwhile, it takes time and effort. Remember, "cows don't *give* milk; you have to work for it."

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



### This year's WA TCH charity is BLOOD CANCER UK

Leukaemia, lymphoma, myeloma and all types of blood cancer caused by changes (mutations) in the DNA within blood cells. This causes the blood cells to start behaving abnormally. In almost all cases, these changes are linked to things we can't control. Research that is on going in Edinburgh and other centres in the UK means that it can in some cases be detected early and treatment provided. It affects both adults and, sadly, many more children than you would think. So, we decided BLOOD CANCER UK was our charity for this year and all your help and support in raising funds is much appreciated. The money we raise will help continue the research and also sustain the Nurses and Support workers who are based in Anderson Street, Leith they provide help and advise to those who have been diagnosed.

We started our fund raising with the **summer coin collection** each Sunday. #### BLACKHALL'S EVE NAIRN-MAGNANTE SHINES IN INCLUSIVE CHILDREN'S PUBLISHING

The North Edinburgh community is beaming with pride over the remarkable achievements of 15-year-old Blackhall resident, Eve Nairn-Magnante. A talented young author, Eve has made waves with her enchanting children's book, *Santa Steals Christmas!*, a heartwarming festive tale that champions inclusivity. Despite her youth, Eve has already won several accolades and is leading the charge in ensuring that all children, regardless of ability, can enjoy the magic of reading.

Eve's book, *Santa Steals Christmas!*, is a whimsical Christmas mystery with a clever twist. The story follows Santa, Rudolph, and the elves as they race against the clock to unmask a mischievous imposter stealing presents on Christmas Eve. Although too young to be eligible to enter most literary competitions, Eve's work has been recognised by all 3 competitions she was allowed to enter. Her book recently won the Children's Literature Festival Children's Book of the Year Award (voted for by children), the Ink Book Prize Children's Fiction Award and Eve is now the youngest ever person to be Highly Commended by The Herald Scotland's Diversity & Inclusion Awards (in the Design for Diversity category).

In addition to earning her recognition from the literary community, Eve's work has been celebrated for its generosity. Last Christmas she donated over 2,000 copies of her books to local schools, charities and hospitals. In addition to this, 5% of the book's sales are donated to Dyslexia Scotland, Seescape, Deaf Action and Scottish Autism, which aligns perfectly with the book's inclusive ethos.

Despite her success, Eve remains humble, preferring to let her story and its message take centre stage. She hopes that *Santa Steals Christmas!* will inspire other authors and publishers to adopt a more inclusive approach to children's books, ensuring that every child can enjoy the magic of storytelling, regardless of their abilities.

As one local fan said, "Eve's book is not just a great story for Christmas, but a symbol of what can be achieved when inclusivity and creativity come together."

As Blackhall celebrates the achievements of this young star, Eve Nairn-Magnante stands as a shining example of the power of local talent, proving that no dream is too big, and no author too young to make a difference. Her work is not only a gift to readers this Christmas but a lasting contribution to the world of children's literature, one that ensures no child is left behind. Our second Congratulations go to our own Rev Fergus Cook, who has been going through the process to become a Naval Chaplain for some time now. He has become what they think is the oldest person to 'pass out' and receive a commission in the Royal Naval reserve at Britannia Royal Naval College on Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> November.

Chaplains play an important role offering not just religious support but important pastoral support to all faiths and none within a ship's company. Royal Navy chaplains are unique compared to their Royal Air Force and Army colleagues in that they don't hold a military rank and are referred to solely as Royal Navy Chaplain, or more commonly Bish!

Fergus says it has been a real challenge to get through to this stage and says he has been blessed with a huge amount of support from his Kirk Session and congregation. He went on, "in the Navy the role of the Chaplain is to be 'a friend and adviser to all'. Throughout my training I have had opportunities to share my faith as the people I work with ask about my role and the job I do. It is a fantastic opportunity to work alongside a great bunch of



dedicated men and women who are all there to serve others. Many of the core values of the Royal Navy dovetail nicely with the Christian faith and it is great to speak about faith with people who may not have had much to do with it before."

From gentle Yin Yoga to powerful Vinyasa, in the morning or the evening, there is a class to suit everyone.



Blackhall Nursery is situated within the wonderful nature resource of Ravelston Park and Woods. At Blackhall Nursery, we put the children at the heart of everything we do. We provide a safe, healthy and happy environment where children grow and develop through play and active learning.

We began our new term in August, welcoming new families as well as lots of returning ones. We spent the term getting to know the children and their families. After the October holiday we began our woodland walks, where the children explore Ravelston Woods in small groups, looking out for the changing seasons, building shelters and learning how to take appropriate risk by climbing trees, balancing on logs etc. We play outside everyday supporting the children to develop their gross motor skills and to stay physically active. We have learned about Diwali, St Andrew's Day and took part in World Nursery Rhyme week. December brings great excitement. We enjoyed a trip to St Columbas Church to hear the Nativity story, told with wonderful knitted props, we raised money through the Christmas jumper day and we are looking forward to our Christmas party.

Some new experiences were also enjoyed such as caving and team building low ropes.









#### **Wordsearch for Christmas 2024**

Father Christmas is based on St Nicholas, who was born in the 3rd century in the Greek village of Patara, on what is today the southern coast of Turkey. His family were both devout and wealthy, and when his parents died in an epidemic, Nicholas decided to help people. He gave to the needy, the sick, the suffering, and was made Bishop of Myra while still a young man. As a bishop, he suffered in prison with other bishops under the emperor Diocletian's persecution of Christians.

One story of his generosity explains why we hang Christmas stockings over our mantelpieces today. There was a poor family with three daughters who needed dowries if they were to marry, and not be sold into slavery. Nicholas heard of their plight, and tossed three bags of gold into their home through an open window – thus saving the girls from a life of misery. The bags of gold landed in stockings or shoes left before the fire to dry. Hence the custom of children hanging out stockings – in the hope of attracting presents of their own from St Nicholas - on Christmas Eve. That is why three gold balls, sometimes represented as oranges, are one of the symbols of St Nicholas.


