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


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HOPE

The other day I gave a reflection at a local care home about hope. I began by sharing a story about a time when I saw a Miracle and how that Miracle was connected to Hope.

I went back to the days when I was at university training for the ministry in order to become a minister. At that time, I was also working as a lifeguard and as a swimming



It was there I saw a Miracle connected to Hope. I say I saw a Miracle and that is because there was only one of her and she was at the Church to be baptised. I said that Miracle was connected to Hope because Hope was her little sister. I knew that because they were both in one of my swimming classes. They are wonderful names and, as you can probably tell from their beautiful names, both girls were of African descent.

If you google the word hope, you will find it says; 'Hope is a feeling of expectation and desire for a certain thing to happen.' Hope is the desire for a certain outcome that is different from the situation we find ourselves in.

In Paul's letter to the Romans 8: 24-25, we are told:

For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope, for who hopes for what one already sees? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

When we read these verses, faith immediately springs to mind (another popular name.) There is a correlation, a connection between hope and faith. Faith can be defined as a complete trust in someone or something. Although faith, as defined, does not include a specific outcome, as hope generally does, the two are intrinsically intertwined and interrelated.

We can see this from the letter to the Hebrews where at chapter 11 verse 1 it says: *Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen*.

Faith and hope work together. We cannot have faith without hope, and we cannot have hope without faith. Both faith and hope require patience, endurance and perseverance. We never hope for something we already have, we always hope for an expectation of something better than our present reality. We need to always remember that our present situation is never permanent. Our present circumstances do not represent our final outcome!

We also need to remember that whenever we are hoping for something, we are waiting. Whenever we are are hoping for something, there is a period when nothing is happening; at least in relation to thing we are hoping for. There is a time when the thing we are looking forward to has not yet come to fruition, it has not come to pass yet. We are able to hope, or wait, not because we can see it but because we are confident that it will come to pass in due time. As the Psalmist put it; *And now, O Lord, what do I wait for? My hope is in you.* (Psalm 39:7). This, in turn, requires faith, in order to believe that what we hope for will come to fruition. As we wait, we must remember to endure. As I said, perseverance is a requirement whilst we hope. Hope is not always easy, it requires determination, it requires focus and, ultimately, it requires trust. It is like the Proverb says *Hope deferred makes the heart sick, but a desire fulfilled is a tree of life.* (Proverbs 13:12)

Put another way sometimes the waiting in hope can make us feel sick but, when at last a hope becomes fulfilled, when a dream becomes a reality, it makes all the waiting all the more worthwhile and the reality all the sweeter.

God, through Jesus Christ, has made us many promises. By persevering in prayer, by trusting in God's word, by putting our faith in Him, we can continue to hope and endure the waiting that comes with that. Then, when that desire finally comes to fruition, our joy will be complete.

As you read this article, the Advent season is upon us. Advent is a season observed in most Christian denominations as a time of waiting and preparation for both the celebration of Jesus's birth at Christmas and the return of Christ at the Second Coming. At this time, in the world we have much to wish for. The world is in turmoil with conflict and the risk of it spreading. The economic situation is bad for many people. Now is a time when we need hope.

The message of Christmas is hope. Jesus is sometimes referred to as *Emmanuel* which translates as *God with us*. Whilst God is always with us, it is through Jesus and His teaching that we can learn how to be reconciled to God. It is that reconciliation that gives Christians hope. As we prepare to celebrate Christmas and mark the birth of Jesus Christ, we also prepare ourselves for what is referred to as the Second Coming. There are different understandings of what that means and what that will look like, but it is through the teachings of Jesus that we learn to have the faith that our hopes will be ultimately fulfilled.



The nights are truly drawing in now, and our gardens are getting ready for winter. There are still warm days occasionally which encourage us out to tackle a few tasks, including sweeping leaves off our lawns. The latest advice is to leave them on the flower beds! The first named storm of the year, Storm Amy, swept through early in October, hopefully not causing too much damage.

Our 25/26 season began in October with a very interesting talk by Sarah Gerhardt, from Gerhardt's Garden Service, on Stonecrops for dry gardens. The group includes sedums which we are probably well aware of. We learnt how these drought tolerant and adaptable plants can help future proof our gardens while supporting pollinators. Sarah gave us a propagation demonstration and we were able to buy plants.

The programme for the rest of the 25/26 session includes talks on trees by Bob Glen on his project to reforest parts of Scotland, Bees in our Gardens, Shade Plants and a talk by MT O'Donnell from Scotland Grows magazine. We will be having a Christmas Social in December with drinks and nibbles, a display demonstration and a quiz.

JUNIOR SINGERS




Glenn Jamieson tells us a little about why they have established themselves in 'the dip'.

Blackhall St Columba's is very excited to be hosting the **Knitted Bible** - 36 scenes from both the Old and New Testaments of the Bible in knitted form, created in 2008 by over 40 people in St George's URC in Hartlepool. It will be on display in the church from **Friday 13th March until Friday 20th March 2026**. Further information regarding opening times will be available nearer the time.

This is *only the second time it has been displayed in Scotland* (the first being at St Annes's in Dunbar earlier this year). So, it is a rare opportunity to see this very special exhibit. Were you aware that by donating only £40 your name is printed on their new air ambulance? Here's hoping after the talk, the name, Craigleith Probus, will be clearly embossed six or more times! Like many others our family has had the benefit of the use of an air ambulance and it is such a worthy charity for us to consider in 2026.

With early narcissi showing and giving the message of Easter we look forward, on Wednesday 4th March, to the visit by Adam Cumming, Chair of Scotland's Churches Trust (SCT), and his talk on *Medieval Churches of Edinburgh*. The SCT seeks to protect Scotland's rich cultural and ecclesiastical heritage to preserve it for future generations, whether the reasons are religion, history, architecture, culture or genealogy.

Our session concludes on March 18th when we welcome back James Waugh who will tell us about the completion of the *Trans USA Railway*.

PARKING AT CRAIGLEITH SHOPPING CENTRE

As Christmas approaches you may well find yourself parking at Craigleith Shopping Centre to visit the various stores there. Did you know that there is a time limit on how long you can park without being fined?

Did you know the Car Park at Sainsburys is run by a different company to the one at M&S/ Currys/Boots?

No? Well unless you are a giraffe with excellent eyesight that's not surprising as the notices are so high on the poles. To help you know the difference **in charges** if you overstay the **3 hours** I attempted to photograph both. As you can see, if you are over 3 hours at Sainsburys the fine is £75. However, at the M&S end it is £100! Both fines go up if you do not pay when you receive your fine. I know of several people who have been fined recently.

BUT you can avoid this (after all if they are going to fine you for shopping there it does seem more than a bit ridiculous). You can park in one car park and then move to the other before your 3 hours are up. The Group Nexus (M&S end)photograph you going in and out and you cannot return to their car park for 1.5 hours. Sainsburys (Euro Car Parks) do not seem to do this as yet. Should you receive a fine, you can appeal to the managers of Craigleith Shopping Centre, showing your receipts for the shopping you did on that day. This usually results in the cancelling of the fine. After all, getting an eye test, shopping in M&S, Lidl and possibly Currys would take over 3 hours. As would a visit to the grooming parlour at Pets at Home.

The problem was caused by people parking their cars for the day and taking a bus into town. That resulted in lack of space for customers. But now customers are being penalised for being loyal! The Gyle has, I believe, similar restrictions

though possibly 4 hours there. *Happy fine free shopping*!

BLACKHALL NURSERY NEWS DECEMBER 2025




