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'Jubilee'

Greetings Blackhall Community,

I have given my article in this edition of the Bulletin the simple title of 'Jubilee'. What does this word conjure up for you? What do you think of when you hear that word mentioned?

Many will associate this word simply with the impending celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II is being celebrated this year



throughout the Commonwealth to mark the 70th anniversary of her accession to the throne on 6 February 1952. Whilst many will focus on this specific Jubilee, others, who are older (like myself), might remember back to previous royal celebrations such as the relatively, recent Golden Jubilee or even the Silver Jubilee of 1977. (I still have a commemorative coin from that one.)

If you look at the Royal UK website it states; 'Royal Jubilees are an occasion to celebrate the life and reign of a Monarch, and are significant events which are celebrated around the world. Though the concept of the jubilee began in biblical times, today the term is most closely associated with the Royal Family, and the ceremony and spectacle which the term symbolises.'

I think that many today will not realise that, as it says in the above extract, 'the concept of the jubilee began in biblical times'. One of the many things Queen Elizabeth II has been praised for throughout her reign is her obvious and public faith and the commitment she has shown to it. The reigning monarch of the United Kingdom holds a very unusual position in relation to their role in the different churches throughout their Kingdom.

This position goes back to the Union of the Crowns which was the point in our history when James VI of Scotland was, on 24 March 1603, proclaimed "James the first, King of England, France, and Ireland, defender of the faith". This union made the newly crowned king 'Supreme Governor of the Church of England'- a title that originated with Henry VIII. King James I was much impressed by the organisation of the Church of England and was a fan of the 'episcopate', the system of bishops and archbishops. As head of the Church, he got to appoint these individuals. In fact, for a while, he tried to introduce an episcopacy to the Church of Scotland but was prevented from doing so.

The difference between the king's positions with regard to the Church of England and with regard to the Church of Scotland had been highlighted to the King previously by Andrew Melville, a Scottish scholar, theologian, poet, religious reformer and also, at one time, Moderator of the Church of Scotland. In 1594, at a fractious meeting with Scottish nobles, Melville famously took King James VI by the sleeve and, calling him "God's silly vassal", said, "This is not a time to flatter, but to speak plainly, for our commission is from the living God, to whom the king is subject. We will always humbly reverence your majesty in public, but having opportunity of being with your majesty in private, we must discharge our duty, or else be enemies to Christ: And now, Sire, I must tell you that there are two kingdoms—the kingdom of Christ, which is the church, whose subject King James VI is, and of whose kingdom he is not a head, nor a lord, but a member; and they whom Christ hath called, and commanded to watch over his church, and govern his spiritual kingdom, have sufficient power and authority from him so to do, which no Christian king nor prince should control or discharge, but assist and support, otherwise they are not faithful subjects to Christ."

This tale serves to outline the difference in the monarch's roles between the Churches of England and Scotland. Whilst they are Head of the Church of England, the British monarch, at their coronation, vows only to uphold the constitution of the Church of Scotland, which is a Presbyterian national church. The monarch does not hold a leadership position in the Church of Scotland. Despite this, the monarch does appoint a Lord High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland each year as their personal representative. This person has a purely ceremonial role. The Queen, on occasion, has filled the role personally as when she opened the General Assembly in 1977 and again in 2002 when she celebrated her Silver and Golden Jubilees respectively.

Returning to the word 'Jubilee', I mentioned that its origins were biblical. In Leviticus chapter 25, we find the first reference to Jubilee as part of the law given by God to the Israelites. These verses describe God's intent that the Israelites should remain free from slavery for all time by instituting a Sabbath year every seven years. The Jubilee year was to occur after every seventh Sabbath year, in other words every 50 years. The Jubilee was to be an economic, cultural, environmental and communal reset when the land and people were to rest and all those who were in slavery were to be set free to return to their communities. The Jubilee laws were essentially concerned with social relationship, economic security, stability and the well-being of the/

community. They sought to ensure that people lived in ways that reflected good relationships with God, with each other, and with creation. This strikes me as something we could well do with in our current society nowadays.

C.B. Samuel is a former head of the charity EFICOR, Tearfund's Indian partner. He is a current Associate Fieldworker in India and spends his time teaching and mentoring Christian leaders in India and around the world. C.B.Samuel writes, "Jubilee was a recovery of identity, especially for the poor. It is not about simply correcting economic problems, which is very important; not even just caring for the poor because they're poor; but it is restoring identity, which is a part of their history and very important for them. Jubilee operated as a corrective because people were tight-fisted and hard-hearted. When we talk about Jubilee now, people are reluctant – it's a problem of the heart, not a problem of economics."

Most scholars question whether the laws relating to Jubilee ever were implemented but Samuel continues, "The assumption is that it was not practised. But that does not mean it is not an important law... The law was given to the people of Israel so that they would know the intention of God, the heart of God."

The intention of God, the heart of God is that people should not be doomed to slavery, poverty and injustice. It is God's will that everyone is entitled to live fully. In the New Testament, Jesus presents himself as the One who brings the old Jubilee to completion because he has come to "preach the year of the Lord's favour" (Isaiah 61: 1-2). In the Roman Catholic Church, jubilees began to be celebrated formally in 1300 AD and are years of forgiveness of sins and reconciliation. They are celebrated every 25 years. The most recent year of jubilee for their Church was 2000.

Ultimately, as people of faith, we are reminded by the word Jubilee that we worship and follow a God who brings freedom. What we see in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus is God taking on human form in order to provide Jubilee's objective of release from sin, restoration with God and a resetting for all of creation. We are liberated by Jesus' life, death and resurrection, each being events which become the foundation of our hope for the future: the new creation that we are promised.

WA⊕**CH COMMITTEE**



This year we will raise funds for the local charity Pilton Equalities Project (P.E.P.). They support older people and vulnerable groups and are now restarting their lunch clubs and other activities. Currently they are using their minibuses to transport displaced families from Ukraine.

We intend to follow the traditional program of a Summer Coin Collection, an October Craft Coffee Morning and the Christmas Fair on 26th November. More details will be published in future editions of Kirk News and the Blackhall Bulletin and through intimations at church services.

The WA&CH Committee has had great support from the congregation and the local community since it was formed in 1991, raising more than £275,000 for good causes in that time. We hope this year to get back to normality!

SERVICE OF REDEDICATION AND CELEBRATION OF ORDINATION AND INDUCTION

Many of our readers will be aware of the extensive refurbishment undertaken during 2019/21 in the Church.

You will also be aware that in March 2020, the day before the Covid 19 lockdown, Rev Fergus Cook was Ordained and Inducted as the Minister for Blackhall St Columba's.

The restrictions relating to control of spread of the coronavirus meant that, until recently, we had not been in a position to celebrate either Fergus's arrival, or our new Sanctuary.

On Sunday 20th March 2022, we remedied that with a joint celebration in the church followed by an afternoon tea in the halls.

On this very special occasion and the church looked magnificent with wonderful floral displays of lilies adding colour and fragrance.





A commemorative plaque was unveiled by Rev Julia Wiley, Moderator of the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian.

It was a busy service with much to dedicate and celebrate. After the Choir sang "Christ our Cornerstone", The Rev Gordon Farquharson who had been our Locum Minister before Fergus arrived, led the congregation in prayer.

We sang that great hymn "Ye Gates Lift Up Your Heads on High", then Fay Stirling, who was the project manager for the refurbishment of the Sanctuary spoke about the work that had been done, thanked all of those involved and played a short timelapse video which showed the transformation from old to new. Following another hymn, a prayer and an appropriate Scripture reading, our Session Clerk, Eddie Thorn dedicated a new Lectern for the Church. This was gifted by the Rev Cook, his wife Shona and their family, and is made from wood salvaged from the pews taken out during the refurbishment. The choir sang the anthem "Be Thou my Vision", then Eddie Thorn led the celebration of Fergus's Ordination and Induction.

He reflected on the challenging start Fergus had to his ministry in Blackhall, with the church closed for renovation, the Covid restrictions meaning the congregation could not meet, and not knowing, or being able to really get to know anyone in the congregation or the parish. Eddie noted, however, that Fergus had used all of the resources at his disposal and quickly established online services every week, and with the support of the Elders, ensured everyone in the congregation had the opportunity to join in.

Eddie addressed Fergus directly and assured him of the full and complete support of the Congregation, then presented him with a travelling Communion set which can be used in people's homes, hospital, or other settings to administer Communion.

Rev Richard Frazer who officiated at the actual Ordination and Induction was unable to join us, however, he had sent a message which Eddie read out.

It was lovely to welcome so many friends of the congregation past and present and, in particular, friends of the Cooks from the West of Scotland joining with the family at this special service. Feedback tells me they felt very welcome and were mightily impressed with our beautiful church.

Elspeth Williamson and her small battalion of helpers, together with what must have been a full army of bakers, put on a fantastic afternoon which was appreciated by everyone.

All in all, it was a day of joy, at a time when on several fronts things are quite bleak, and we gave thanks that we were able to come together for this very special afternoon.

COULD YOU DO WITH A BIT OF COMPANY?

- WE HAVE JUST THE PLACE

Loneliness can affect all of us, and sometimes just a few minutes chat with someone makes all the difference. Even busy people can be lonely, and often find it difficult to take time to really have a good talk.

Loneliness isn't something particular to any type, age or group of people, it can affect anyone at any time, and The Marmalade Trust is holding UK National Loneliness Week from $13^{th} - 17^{th}$ June.

The ITV programme Good Morning Britain's One Million Minutes campaign to tackle loneliness resulted in six "listening benches" being installed in UK towns – with one of these on the Royal Mile here in Edinburgh. Kelly Williams, from Yorkshire, is encouraging people to set up "happy benches" to encourage people to sit down and chat with strangers. She has received interest from people all over the globe.

This year Blackhall St Columba's Church decided to install a "Happy to Chat" bench to provide a space for people to chat and ease loneliness. The Happy to Chat bench seeks to break down barriers and allow us to all say 'hello'.



Located in the garden area between the Church and Queensferry Road, if you fancy a chat, please take a seat and hopefully someone will join you. By sitting on the bench, people will know that you're open to a friendly talk. If you see someone sitting there, why not consider approaching them and have a chat. You might learn something new, make a new friend, or simply brighten someone's day!

As in the Chinese proverb "a journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step", the journey from loneliness can start with the first hello. Let's all take a few moments to brighten someone's day.




FreshStart have been very busy over the last few months and stocks of items for the "starter packs" that are given to people who were formally homeless and are now moving into new homes. Items most needed are Crockery, cutlery, bedding (NOT DUVETS OR PILLOWS), towels and kitchen utensils (NOT KNIVES OR SCISSORS). Little used pots and pans also most welcomed. In addition, personal toiletries and non-perishable food items for emergency packs are particularly in short supply at the moment.


We have restarted the Friday morning manned collection point in the church halls so if you have items to donate our volunteers will be happy to accept them between 10 and 11.30am on most Fridays. They will also be able to advise you on the full list of items that FreshStart require.

Items can be brought in at other times and on these occasions the church officer will direct you to the FreshStart Cupboard area.

We now have a Pantry food collection box in the entrance to the halls for the new "Pantry Shop" project. It is hoped that the whole community can donate non perishable items to this. A list of suitable items is detailed on the box. It should be noted that the pantry shop is not a food bank but as FreshStart say for low-income families this is affordable food with dignity. Low-income families become members of the pantry shop and pay a weekly subscription of £4.50 which allows them to purchase quality food approx up to £20 worth. FreshStart via partnerships offers a basic range of goods but does rely on donations of tinned or packaged items to help low-income families eat better. This is another way for the church and community to further support for the good work carried out by FreshStart.






"THE SERVANT QUEEN"

Monarch and mother, grandmother and great grandmother; a senior citizen who continues to work many hours each week, who employs around 1200 people but feeds her own dogs; the most famous and most photographed woman in the world - the Queen is by any measure a remarkable woman.

In fact, the three word title of a beautifully illustrated book published to celebrate her 90th birthday aptly describes her role as she sees it, not as ruler over the people but as servant of the people. Focusing on her own words, spoken throughout the longest reign in British history, the book gives a rare insight into the Queen's personal thoughts and the source of her inner strength. It reveals a life of total commitment to service and gives clear evidence of her constant encouragement to others to do the same.



Now, seven years later, as we commemorate her Platinum Jubilee and enjoy an extra holiday to celebrate however we choose, we can only marvel at the resilience and enthusiasm of this amazing woman, who continues to fulfil the promise she made at her coronation and which she reiterated in her radio broadcast to the nation on her 21st birthday -

"...THAT MY WHOLE LIFE, WHETHER IT BE LONG OR SHORT, SHALL BE DEVOTED TO YOUR SERVICE."



Paradoxical though it may seem, leading by serving is a key theme of strong and successful leadership, as exemplified by Her Majesty throughout her reign. It is the basic training principle of the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst, where "Serve to Lead" is not only the motto on the young officers' cap badge, but the title of the official text studied by all in their preparation for a career in the British Army. In the words of one of the contributors, each an outstanding military or political leader,

"IF SERVING IS BENEATH YOU, THEN LEADERSHIP IS BEYOND YOU."

and that resonates so clearly with the life of service to others as practised by the Head of the Armed Forces herself.

Year after year, in her Christmas message, the Queen has referred to her personal faith in God and to the teachings of Jesus concerning love for one's neighbour. In 2012 she spoke about how "God sent his only Son to serve, not to be served" and referred to how "love and service should be at the centre of our lives", before going on to share her hope that "his example and teaching will continue to bring people together to give the best of themselves in the service of others".

Whatever our political or religious views, surely we have much to gain as a community in Blackhall by putting these principles into action.

"Love All - Serve All" may be the mission statement of the Hard Rock Cafe, as I spotted on a recent walk down George Street, but it's even more important for us in Strachan Road and Columba Avenue...... and whichever street we call our home.

Let's celebrate - not just the Platinum Jubilee weekend, but the whole year - by making the most of every opportunity to -

Rae describes her garden as a newly designed (and surprisingly large) south-facing garden where much of the original design and structure has been retained.

RESOL STRING QUARTET with PIANIST JIA NING NG

"I'm so glad I came"

"Wonderful to have classical music on our doorstep"

"What a marvellous evening"

These are just a few of the comments following the evening of music at Blackhall St. Columba's Church in April.



Having performed for us last year, Jia Ning Ng returned with the Resol String Quartet (www.resolstringquartet.com) to perform Mozart's Piano Concerto No20 in D minor and Beethoven's Piano Concerto Op. 58. It was an added bonus that her parents, who had travelled from Singapore were able to be part of the audience.



Jia Ning introduced the pieces, talking about them in the context of the time. Composed in 1785, Mozart's Piano Concerto 20 was an immediate success, though unusual being written in a minor key. Mozart, led the orchestra from the keyboard performing the solo part himself.

Likewise, Beethoven was soloist at both the private premier in 1807 and the public premier in 1808.

It was a wonderful opportunity to hear and see talented young musicians and appreciate the acoustics of the refurbished sanctuary.

The evening ended with Jia Ning playing the well-known hymn "The Old Rugged Cross" and inviting the audience to sing.

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BLACKHALL COMMUNITY TRUST NEWS



The Board of Blackhall Community Trust (BCT) is very much hoping that community events will be on the cards again shortly and we look forward to seeing everyone again in person, and to resuming activities and fundraising events.

At the time of writing, we are still waiting to hear the outcome of a re-run of the Community Asset Transfer consultation process but hope that this will finally allow Ravelston Park Pavilion and adjacent land to transfer from the City of Edinburgh Council to Blackhall Community Trust, on behalf of residents. There is an urgent need for a new fit-for-purpose building to accommodate Blackhall Nursery so that local families can access their government-funded 1140 hours early learning and childcare entitlement, and for more community space. The Board is very pleased that ongoing work with architect Malcolm Fraser of Fraser Livingstone towards final designs has allowed us to reduce considerably the area of land being requested under the CAT process.
