## From the Minister

#### What's in a name?

Recently, we have been exploring the possibility of a union with our friends and neighbours at Drylaw Parish Church. As many, if not all, of you by now know, that will not be going ahead as first envisaged. We will need to wait on Presbytery and the Central Office finalising what the way forward is now.



Leaving the eventual outcome aside, the process we went through was an interesting one. Many people were able to express their opinions on numerous different matters. I always say that, as Christians, we do not have to agree with each other on everything and that it is how we disagree that sets us apart. The world tends to see issues as polarising with social and other forms of media seeking to delight in setting one group of people against another in direct conflict. You only have to think, historically, about the debates around Scottish Independence, Brexit and each General Election we have to see that this is true. As Christians, we should be able to disagree with one another in a respectful way where, even if agreement is not reached, we remain friends and followers of Christ.

In our discussions about union, one of the issues that seemed to be of great importance to some people was the name of the united Church. To be fair, this is one of the most hotly discussed topics in every Church union. In particular, the proposed 'removal' of St Columba's from the united church's name troubled many. We should note that the Church was not always called Blackhall St Columba's Parish Church. Indeed, quoting from Margaret McArthur's excellent book "Blackhall St Columba's Church, The First Hundred Years", she writes, 'In the beginning the new church was sometimes referred to as Blackhall Chapel of Ease or the Church at Craigcrook and the name St Columba's was finally decided upon as the original parish church of Cramond had been dedicated to that saint.' So, Church names can and do evolve and change.

#### What's in a name?

Indeed, Cramond Kirk, whose minister gave the name St Columba's to Blackhall Church, is now officially known as Edinburgh: Northwest Kirk. The Northwest Kirk formed as a result of a union between Cramond Kirk and the Old Kirk and Muirhouse. The Old Kirk and Muirhouse, whilst sharing the name Northwest Kirk with Cramond, has now also amended its name and is now calling its buildings Pennywell Kirk!

Whilst I completely understand people's concerns over proposed changes such as this, we need to always remind ourselves of and focus on our mission statement to the people of Blackhall; to glorify God, proclaim Christ and serve others.

Of course, where there is a will, there is a way. Compromise and an ability to adapt are key. Even though a union between our two churches is now held in abeyance and, therefore, there will be no immediate name change, I have proposed to the Kirk Session that we rename the North Transept, also known as the North Aisle, 'The St Columba's Chapel', and they have agreed. This means that, when we have our regular afternoon communion, we will hold it in The St Columba's Chapel. This will be the same for other services including some memorial services. This should ensure that, irrespective of any future decisions about union, the name 'St Columba's will continue to be associated with our Church.

At the same time as, hopefully, reassuring those who were concerned about any loss of a connection to the name St Columba, we should also remind ourselves that the only truly important name we should always cling to is that of Jesus Christ Himself.

#### What's in a name?

It is recorded, in the Acts of the Apostles, that John spoke before the Council and said, "let it be known to all of you, and to all the people of Israel, that this man is standing before you in good health by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead. This Jesus is 'the stone that was rejected by you, the builders; it has become the cornerstone.' "There is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among mortals by which we must be saved." (Acts 4:10-12)

# Session Clerk's Report

#### The Kirk Session

The Kirk Session met on Tuesdays 3 September and 15 October 2024.

#### **Building For the Future 2**

The Clerk informed Kirk Session that the balance of the fund as of 31 July 2024 stood at £83,642. These monies are held in a restricted fund in respect of work specifically at Blackhall St Columba's Church. The Clerk asked Session if there was any wish to carry out project work in the halls area or defer for a future debate. Jim Bishop and Mike Whiteside were delegated to review papers connected with the initial refurbishment programme (for the Sanctuary and adjoining halls) and report back to the January meeting.

#### Correspondence

Notes of thanks were received from Ferryhill Primary School in respect of food donated by the Congregation.

#### **North Sanctuary**

The Moderator put forward a proposal to rename the North Sanctuary and suggested 'St Columba's Chapel'. After discussion the Kirk Session voted in favour of the proposed name.

#### **Office Staffing**

For the time being Ruth Laidlaw and the Session Clerk have been dealing with Office matters while Sheila Mackintosh has been handling all hall bookings. The plan was to review this arrangement post the Union.

# The Presbytery Plan - An update on the planned Union with Drylaw Parish Church.

On Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> of October, the congregations of Blackhall St Columba's and Drylaw Parish Church voted an acceptance of the Basis of the Union. The results were as follows:

Union of Parish	For	Against	Abstentions
Blackhall St. Columba's	124	13	0
Drylaw Parish Church	25	4	0

Drylaw Parish Church was required to vote on the acceptance of the adoption of Rev Fergus Cook as their Minister. The voting was as follows: -

Adoption of Minister	For	Against	Abstentions
Drylaw Parish Church	11	15	3

Consequently, the planned Union cannot now take place. At the time of writing, the Kirk Session awaits to hear from the Presbytery Deployment Committee. The Committee must now meet to assess the outcome and look at the options for going forward.

#### The Future

Mr Cook has intimated that, whilst no one knows the future, he has no plans other than to continue as the Minister of Blackhall St Columba's. He has been immensely grateful for the huge amount of support afforded to him at this time.

The Congregation will be kept informed of pertinent developments.





# Celebrating Life with Burns

#### REMEMBER, DINNAE EVER FORGET



Owen, Sassoon, Brooke & Rosenberg were poets who wrote passionately about the horrors of the First World War, which they experienced when serving in the army. Only one survived this War and he got to know another when both were in hospital in Edinburgh to get them fit to return to the front. This other poet like the remaining two died when only in their 20's. They left their poetic legacies however and are well known today. Like me google or otherwise research a little more about the poets but just for now think on —

"The poor brave sodger

Never despise nor count him as a stranger

Remember he's his country's stay

In day and hour of danger" \*\*\*

\*\*\* {Inscribed on Davidson's Mains Village War Memorial where wreaths will be laid, as they will at Blackhall's Memorial, on Remembrance Sunday, 10<sup>th</sup> of November 2024}.

Words from a different time and society but from another poet, who also died young (37) and left his mark indelibly on both English and Scots tongues and international music. Burns is still celebrated all worldwide. He wrote not just denouncing war but also denouncing man's inhumanity to man generally, railing at hypocrisy wherever its roots, but all the while recognising human frailties and faults including his own. Of course, he still wanted, like us all, to live a life not just free of evils like war and other depressing situations but to spend time with others all enjoying themselves. He wrote about all that too. We can and should always remember those who serve and served their country, some of whom died doing so.

Once you have perused all these stalls, you will be glad to stop for a festive refreshment. In the Sanctuary, you can sit and listen to some Christmas music.





# Church of Scotland submits written evidence on Assisted Dying for Terminally III Adults (Scotland) Bill

The Church has submitted written evidence to a group of MSPs who are investigating the case for legalising assisted dying in Scotland.

The purpose of the Assisted Dying for Terminally III Adults (Scotland) Bill is to introduce a lawful form of assisted dying for people over the age of 16 with a terminal illness.

Scrutiny is being undertaken by the Scottish Parliament's Health, Social Care and Sport Committee and is at stage one of a three-part process.

The Church is "partially opposed" to the legislation becoming law due to its historic opposition to assisted dying while recognising that this position is currently under review following debates and decisions made by the General Assembly in 2023 and 2024.

The Church has extensive experience of walking with people in the final stages of their lives and for many the current societal prohibition on killing means that our role in Christ's call to care is clear.

However, for others this may lead them to support giving terminally ill people the option of an assisted death – views informed by profound and intense personal experience.

A working group formed by the Theological Forum and Faith Action Programme Leadership Team is currently exploring more deeply the diverse views held by Church members on the subject and will report to the General Assembly next year.

## Remembrance 2024



This year Remembrance includes several significant dates from past wars.

2024, marks the 110th anniversary of the start of World War I.

2024 is 80 years since D-Day. The Normandy Landings of 6<sup>th</sup> June were the largest seaborne invasion in history, and began the Allied invasion of Normandy, which led to the liberation of France and laid the foundations of the Allied victory on the Western Front.


2024 marks the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Battle of Monte Cassino in Italy, the bloodiest battle of the Italian Campaign, when Allied forces finally broke through the Germans' notorious 'Gustav Line' and freed Route Six and the way to Rome.

2024 marks the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the battles for Kohima and Imphal, where in northeast India the Imperial Japanese Army was held off by much smaller numbers of British and Indian troops. In Kohima alone, the defenders held off a staggering 25 Japanese attacks over 14 days in appalling conditions. When Indian troops arrived to relieve the defenders, the Japanese encirclement was broken. Amongst the liberators was Havildar Major Rajindar Singh Dhatt of the Royal Indian Army Service Corps, from the Punjab.

2024 also marks the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Operation Market Garden in the Netherlands, when the Allies managed to free Eindhoven and Nijmegen, but famously failed to capture the bridge at Arnhem. (The story is told in the film *A Bridge too Far*)

This year the British Legion is also looking beyond the Second World War, to Kosovo and Afghanistan.

It wants to pay tribute to those who served and currently serve in Kosovo 25 years after the deployment of the NATO peacekeeping force, KFOR, and to those who served in Afghanistan, as this year marks 10 years since the end of Operation Herrick.
