

'SQUARING THE CIRCLE'

Greetings to the Blackhall Community

In May this year, I was a Commissioner at the Church of Scotland General Assembly. During the course of the week, I was struck by a number of things one of which was the number of contributors to various debates who used the expression 'squaring the circle'. They would say things like 'we need to square the circle on this' or even 'we have squared the circle on this matter'. It was used so frequently that it appeared to me that the expression is now part of common parlance but what does it actually mean?



If you are not familiar with it, the expression is an odd one. It's meaning is a little technical but, very briefly, it is all to do with Euclidean geometry which is the study of geometrical shapes and figures based on different axioms and theorems. An axiom is a statement or proposition which is regarded as being established, accepted or self-evidently true. Squaring the circle was originally a problem first proposed in this form of Greek mathematics. It is the challenge of constructing a square with the area of a circle by using only a finite number of steps with a compass and a straightedge. The problem proved to be so difficult that it raised a number of questions as to whether the axioms I mentioned above were in fact accurate. Enough mathematics! Suffice it to say, in 1882, the task was proven to be impossible! There is a long, complicated mathematical explanation as to why squaring the circle is impossible but, as I said, enough mathematics! If you are really interested, feel free to google it.

Why then did all the people at the General Assembly keep referring to needing to do something or actually having done something which was impossible? Clearly, the expression appears to have taken on different meanings from the original geometric meaning.

Philosophically and spiritually, to 'square the circle' means to see equally in four directions—up, down, in and out—and to be whole, complete and free. Circles can sometimes represent the spiritual because they are infinite and have no end. The square is often a symbol of the material because of the number of physical things that come in fours such as four seasons, four directions and the four physical elements of earth, air, fire and water. However, despite the speakers I am referring to being at the General Assembly, I do not think they were using the expression in this philosophical or spiritual sense. I believe these individuals were using the expression as a metaphor. The fact that no one was ever able to 'square the circle' goes some way to explaining its use as a metaphor meaning to attempt a seemingly impossible task such as finding world peace. (It is different from the metaphor, attempting to fit a square peg into a round hole, which implies two things are inherently incompatible.)

The Church of Scotland, as a whole, is facing a number seemingly impossible task. It is trying to take the gospel message of Christ out into a society which increasingly seems disinterested. It is doing this at a time when many of its ministers are reaching retirement age and fewer and fewer people feel called to ministry.

One of the biggest problems we, in the Church of Scotland, face is getting people, including those who continue to attend or support the Church, to understand the magnitude of the problem. Many just want to see the church continue as they have always known it, with one minister looking after one parish church. The problems facing the wider Church have been brought into perspective, here in Edinburgh, by the Consultation Presbytery Plan. There is a need for a plan to be agreed by the end of the year. The plan has to project a way of working that results in a reduction of 40% of ministry posts and 30% of our buildings. This is a huge undertaking. We can see this as an absolute example of 'squaring the circle' - an impossible task or we can look at it as an opportunity to examine how we have been doing things over the years. Personally, I feel there is little point in looking back and regretting the fact that this matter wasn't dealt with decades ago when it should have been. Instead, we need to move forward with openness and positivity. We have an opportunity to do things differently. This will mean that churches need to come together in partnerships and possibly work as team ministries. It will mean having to make ourselves be open to losing some of the things with which we are familiar be that a building, a style of

worship or even just the music we use to praise God. In reality, we aren't actually losing anything, we are just going to have to adapt to new ways of doing things.

The one thing we can be sure of is that, with God behind the plans and changes we make, the task ahead is far from impossible no matter how daunting it may appear to us. The Bible has numerous references to God's capability in this regard. Here are just a few:

Jeremiah 32:17 - "Ah Lord God! It is you who made the heavens and the earth by your great power and by your outstretched arm! Nothing is too hard for you.

Job 42:2 - "I know that you can do all things and that no purpose of yours can be thwarted.


Mark 10:27 and Matthew 19:26-Jesus looked at them and said, "For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible."

These expressions of the infinite power of God to work through us as human beings can be applied in our personal lives as well as to problems such as those that face the wider Church. Each of us faces problems in our daily lives. Some may appear to us to be so hard that we encounter the problem of 'squaring the circle'. Consider these words from the Old and New Testament, from people who have found that, with God's help, nothing is insurmountable and you will realise that no circle cannot be squared!

Gathering Light by David Bleiman



Reverend Ian Gilmour begins his foreword to David Bleiman's booklet by observing that 'Cramond is certainly worth a poem', thus signalling the commitment of a good (locum) parish minister to both his territory and to the arts.

The title poem opens with these beautiful lines,

This was the day we went out

to collect the light . . .

At the time of a pandemic, what could be more important? During the days of winter, what could be more inspiring? For a congregation, for children, for anyone depressed by the cold, the damp, the dark, this collection of poetry brings a light but knowing touch to Cramond and its people.

Cramond Commemorates has involved the whole community. The first tree was a sessile oak, planted by children from Cramond Primary and Cargilfield. Trees are known to talk to one another underground, and in the poem put together from the words of P4 children, we have 'every root is an emotion', and 'my seed drops down', so that 'a tree will reach out like a friend'. I think what is true of trees will be true of poetry like this also.

While the poetry is simple enough to understand – which is not true of all contemporary poetry – there are some nice tongue-twisting sequences to startle you out of just skimming through. How about 'lockdown-quiffed goosanders dip', from 'Not Seeing the Wood for the Words', or 'the door of the loo in Woolloomooloo' from 'Fair-a-Far Fish Ladder', or 'pert potholes cup the murky slosh' from 'February Flashback'?

One of my favourite poems is 'Unoaked', an elegy: Innocent of ill intent, our great oak shaded


Mrs Rankin's renowned Refreshment Rooms . . .

But now the Council has cut it down to half its height, leaving the magnificent tree 'unlimbed, unleaving and unboughed'. And though the pun implied when you read that final word is a final tribute to the spirit of the tree, the reality is spelt out with these sad words, leaving the roots of the tree to deal with their emotions and ours.

The penultimate poem ends with a single word on a single line: 'Imagine!' This booklet, like all good poetry, will let you do that. Jock Stein (poet, piper and preacher)



Why not come along to our own murder mystery event at the church on Saturday 8th October and see how good your detective skills really are?



BLACKHALL COMMUNITY TRUST NEWS



The Board of Blackhall Community Trust (BCT) is very much hoping that community events will be on the cards again shortly and we look forward to seeing everyone again in person, and to resuming activities and fundraising events.

At the time of writing, we are still waiting to hear the outcome of a re-run of the Community Asset Transfer consultation process, but hope that this will finally allow Ravelston Park Pavilion and adjacent land to transfer from the City of Edinburgh Council to Blackhall Community Trust, on behalf of residents. There is an urgent need for a new fit-for-purpose building to accommodate Blackhall Nursery so that local families can access their government-funded 1140 hours early learning and childcare entitlement, and for more community space. The Board is very pleased that ongoing work with architect Malcolm Fraser of Fraser Livingstone towards final designs has allowed us to reduce considerably the area of land being requested under the CAT process.





MUSICIANS WANTED


